## HOLD SAN LUIS

### THREE HOUR FIGHT CLOSES AN ACTIVE DAY.

#### Guerra's Band Dispersed — More Forces of Insurgents in the Field—Former Governor Leads One.

Havana, Aug. 23.—A telegram to the government late last night stated that Maj. Laurent with his detachment of rural guards fought Guerra and his 300 men for three hours, completely defeating him, killing or wounding most insurgents and taking three prisoners.

The dispatch adds that the rebels dispersed in all directions, being chased long distances. None of the rural guards was hurt. Another portion of the insurgent forces continues in occupation of San Luis.

The reports of the commanders of the rural guards are that the band of Guerra, Pozo and others, aggregating over 400 men, concentrated yesterday near San Luis. Seventy rural guards under command of Maj. Laurent went to attack the insurgents from the east and thirty men under Lieut. Azuy went to attack from the west.

Three large bands of insurgents are out in the province of Santa Clara. Gen. Rodriguez, commander of the rural guards, said to the Associated Press: "Cuba is entirely competent to cope with the insurrection. The flood of rumors about the organization of insurrectionary bands in great numbers are not borne out by the facts."

"We have, to date, organized and sent out 300 volunteers under competent officers. We have plenty of Remingtons and ammunition for all who entered at present, and more has been ordered from the United States. Besides, we have thousands of old but serviceable guards."

A gentleman, who has returned from Aguacate, states that as many as 500 men, most of them armed, were riding about the vicinity proclaiming insurrectionary ideas.

Luis Perez, the last liberal governor of the province of Pinar del Rio, has joined the insurgent forces in that province.

A later dispatch from Rancho Voloz, province of Santa Clara, says that a band of insurgents had been organized there under Col. Reinos, and it is believed that Mendicta is with him.

Governor Nunez, of Havana province, says that organization of the local loyal bands, had begun here. American dealers have been commissioned to buy hundreds of horses for the use of the rural guards now being recruited.

Practically all the inhabitants of the town of Aguacate, have with the mayor, declared themselves in insurrection against the government.

The fight with Bandera occurred this morning. A force of 100 mounted rural guards, which had for three days been seeking to surround the insurgent forces, commanded by Bandera, finally succeeded in doing so after the veteran commander had pitched his camp for the night. Two of Bandera's followers were also killed, but none were captured.
