COMMERCIAL MATTERS. SWINDLER GETS AWAY WITH HER MONEY.

Germany is placing orders for smelting iron and coal in England. Failures this week in the dominion were 27; same week, 1905, 24. The organization of the Quebec, Montreal and Southern Railway company has just been completed. Reports from Leamington indicate that the tobacco crop of South Essex will be a poor one and that the peach crop will not be as large as usual. The Dominion liner Cambosman charters to carry the exhibition of British goods on a tour of the world, sails for Montreal next month. The August crop report of the Ontario department of agriculture shows the spring wheat and 224 acreage decreasing. The hay crop was about 20 per cent less than that of 1905 on the same acreage. The apple crop promises less than last year.

**Had Narrow Escape.**  
There was a very narrow escape from a dual drowning accident at Lake Ontario Park on Friday morning. Two young girls, Alice Moore and Clara Robinson were in bathing. They went beyond the raft and overestimated their strength with the result they could not regain the shore. While in grave danger, George Hammond, who has charge of the bathing resort, went to their rescue and brought them in. It was quite a time before the girls were resuscitated and able to return to the city.

## LIGHT PLANT EXTENSIONS.

Tenders Awarded For Various Machinery.

There was a special meeting of the civic light committee, yesterday afternoon, to award tenders for plant extension supplies. It has taken some time to get the tenders figured out. Those present were: Ald. Tove (chairman), Kent, Hoag, Bassan, Gaskin and Elliott. The chief awards were for two 700 kilowatt generators. The direct current generator will be supplied by the Westinghouse company for \$5,000 and the alternating current generator by the Canadian General Electric company for \$4,500, these figures being the lowest. The two lowest tenders for the gas holder were \$10,347 and \$10,300, without the excavations and cement foundation which the plant management will have done. The award for this holder was held in abeyance, in order to find out which is really the better from all points of view. The sum of \$25,000 was the estimate for the holder, but it will be erected at a figure under that amount. All the tenders for the extensions have now been passed by the committee, and the exception of that for the gas holder, and the extensions will be rapidly pushed ahead.

## CORPSES EXPOSED.

**Kansas City, Kas., Aug. 25.**—The washing out of graves at Elmwood cemetery by torrential rains exposed nearly two hundred bodies to view. The cemetery grounds, which are five miles from the business centre of the city, were flooded. Monuments toppled, and other damage was done.

## HAVE TURNED UP.

**The Missing Men Found at the Galoups.**

On Thursday and Friday it was feared that Mr. and Mrs. George Dewitt, of New York, were drowned during a squall on Lake Ontario. Mr. Dewitt, a broker in New York, and his wife have been stopping in Cape Vincent for the past two weeks, and Thursday morning went out in a twenty-five foot launch in charge of R. W. Wendenborn, for a day's fishing near Grenadier Island. They started for home just before dark when the squall came up. A party in another boat, some distance away, saw the occupants of the launch being thrown articles overhead, and then were forced to look after their own safety. When they again looked for the other boat it was not to be seen. Search parties went to the scene Friday morning, but as the boat was six miles from shore when the squall struck it was thought unlikely that the occupants reached land.

Advice received, this morning, states that Mr. and Mrs. Dewitt are safe, having been found at Galoups Island, where they had taken refuge. On Thursday evening guests at the hotel, at Cape Vincent, collected a purse of \$500 and offered it to the captain of a tug at the wharf if he would put out in search of the lost ones. It was not to be seen. A dirty night and tempting bait could not coax such a vessel from her moorings.

Mr. Dewitt was formerly a member of the brokerage firm of C. H. Dewitt & Co., of New York, now dissolved. Mr. and Mrs. Dewitt were married only a few days ago.

## A.O.U.W. Of Ontario.

The grand lodge of this order is showing an excellent exhibit of its financial standing for the current year in its various funds, which now stand: After all warrants were issued and paid to 31st July there were in bankable funds a surplus of \$210,501.28; reserve fund surplus of \$227,731.16; sick benefit fund a surplus of \$262.31; general fund a surplus of \$5,730.87. Total of \$844,223.23. Limestone lodge, No. 91, of this order, located in this city, shows during the past half year the collection and payment of the following amounts to 30th June: Assessment fund paid in, \$5,490.35; paid out, \$5,490.35; general fund paid in, \$449.95; paid out, \$280.19; total paid in, \$5,940.33; total paid out, \$5,770.57.

Its trustees have on hand to credit of general fund: Mortgage, \$700; cash in bank, \$383.66; loans to members, \$250; total, \$1,333.66. What total lodge shows up as well? Don't let us answer at once.

## Yacht Blown Ashore.

The small steamyacht, Margaret, owned by E. McQuaid, of Pittsburgh, Pa., who is summering at the head of Wolfe Island, was blown ashore by the strong wind of Thursday night. She was released without damage by the Calvin tug Frontenac.

The steamer Parthia leaves this evening for Quebec with a raft of lumber. The steamer Calvin and consort Burma, coal-laden, were here yesterday, on route to Quebec. They will load pulpwood for the return trip.

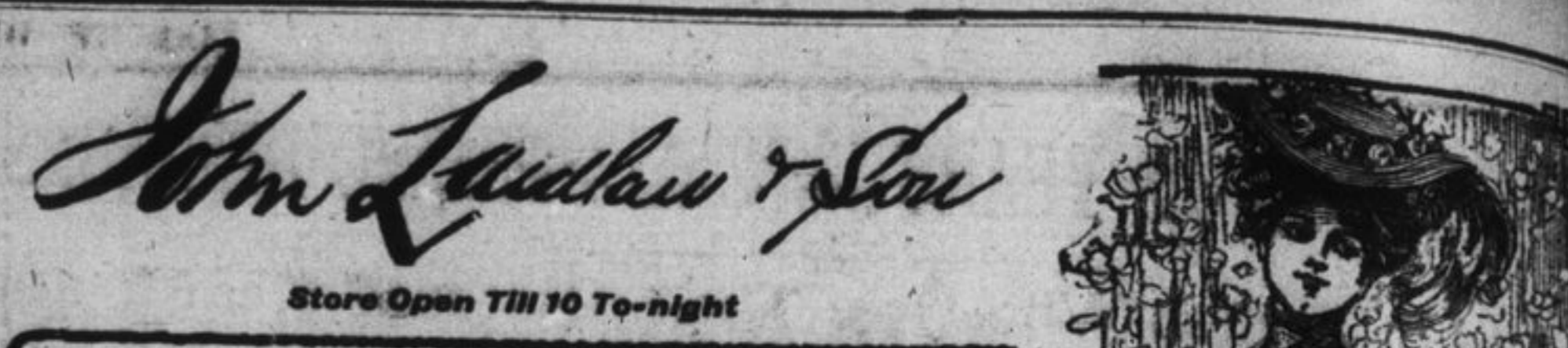
