Preached in St. George's Cathedral, on Sunday.

Rev. G. H. P. Grout, Delhi, N.Y. preached in St. George's cathedral, Sunday morning, basing his remarks on Romans viii, 24: "Saved by May Be Blasted to Allow Big Hope." He pointed to the supreme need of hope in the great apostle's life, since so much of his work was apparently fruitless, and many of its results so quickly overthrown. That his hope was not in vain is abundantly proven by the stability and spread of the church, which in no small measure is the result of his lahour. Time has justified his hopes and shall it not strengthen those who carry on the work of Christ in world, to-day, to realize this.
