TO SAVE HIS EAR.

Rode Miles to Get Member Sewn in Place.
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 30.—After his right ear had been blown from his head by the explosion of a freight engine at Baskrey, on the Spokane Falls & Northern railway, Frank M.
