Work Of The Day.

There are two things for which the Whig stands and with the earnest desire to see them materialize. They have to do with the health and happiness of the people, and they can only be secured by a vigilance which is not easily secured.

The first thing is sanitation. Some diseases that afflict the people, that bring distress and sometimes death, can be avoided, but only by strict observance of the laws which science and experience suggest. Houses, to be free from foul odors and poisons that produce typhoid fever, must be drained, and some habitations are without the necessary sanitary appliances. There are dwellings without drains, and some without the plumbing arrangements that guarantee immunity from disease.

There should be a law which will protect the people from their own indifference. This law should force the masses to do certain common duties in regard to sanitation. Is there such a law now on the statute books? If so why is it not enforced? Is the board of health performing its part efficiently? Is it equal to every demand of the hour, and is it exercising that wise forethought and energy which are incumbent upon men charged with a serious responsibility?

Again the milk used by the people is credited with being the medium of ill-health, and common sense approves of every step which will bring the evidence locally of freedom from contamination on this account. What assurance have the consumers of milk that it is really without taint? The city has a sanitary inspector, but he is occupied during all the summer in the assessment department, and the duties of the health department, so far as he is concerned, must stand. The summer season, however, is the one in which the sanitary measures of the city should be most vigorously enforced.

An occasional inspection of the milk cans, and the occasional announcement that the milk contains a certain percentage of butter fat, is not sufficient. Is the lactical fluid prescribed so freely for its nourishing qualities, and recognized so largely as a food for children, bacteriologically tested? The medical health officer says the city is free from typhoid fever, which has its origin in foul air, impure water or tainted milk. In this condition not a matter of accident rather than good management?

Labour Men Repulsed.

The labour men are being given the evidence that the Whitney government has very little sympathy with them, their plans, desires and aspirations. When the conservatives were seeking office they were deeply devoted to labour interests. They wept and wailed because Central prison convicts were employed in work, the product of which came into contact with the work of free men. That contingency would not continue a day when they were in a position to act upon it.

One of the leaders, Mr. Hendrie, of Hamilton, and running in a constituency in which the labour vote was very strong, pledged himself to end this prison contracting and prison competition. His promises were printed on cards and handed out among the electors.

The Tory party succeeded to power and one of its first acts was to authorize a contract, secretly negotiated, with a wood-working firm for labour and machinery and storage accommodation at the Central prison. The wage rate was ridiculously low. It meant ruin to the employers of free labour or free competition. The labour men protested and in vain. Mr. Hendrie was going to see about it, but he did nothing. Weeks passed and the deal went on. At present he is across the sea and for the time being is away from the charge of treachery.

Now another incident has happened. The secretary of the Ontario Labour Bureau, established by the Ross government, has resigned. It is announced that he is about to accept a place with the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders, but that is because he has been literally frozen out of office. The minister who has to do with his department did not dismiss Mr. Gloeking, but he took the best means of getting rid of him, by ignoring his work and recommendations, and by practically refusing him in the public service by suzerainty. The bureau is capable of great expansion, in the interest of labour, and Mr. Gloeking says that had it been duly considered by the government he never would have regarded the other position.

The attitude of the Whitney government is indicated by the remarks of Mr. Reame, who doubts whether a successor to Mr. Gloeking will be appointed. In other words, the bureau will in all probability be closed and in that way the party will be relieved of all concern with regard to it. The Mail calls the place which Mr. Gloeking occupied a "sinister." The labour men can infer the rest.

Editorial Notes.

The schools will open on time and get down to work as soon as possible. Trustees as well as scholars and teachers are getting back from their holidays.

Some people are forgetting who represents them in the council? This is a result of the long vacation, with the people's business run by some of the officials.

Col. Buchan, of Montreal, knows nothing of the staff changes which are reported so far as he is concerned. He does not expect to be removed from the command of Quebec.

The Globe endorses the Ontario Municipal Union on the ground that it contributes to the power of the municipalities in dealing with municipal reforms. The position is a sound one.

The Ontario credits Hon. Mr. Montague with visiting Belleville in the interest of the bye-election funds. Surely not. The doctor as a great land magnet has something else to do.

The political life of Thomas Crawford, M.P.P., is threatened. He secured the appointment of a friend to the post provincial job, to the contempt of the party executive, and it wants satisfaction.

Two cases in which medical men acted disgracefully have occurred during the last three months, and some people are wondering what the medical council is going to do about them. It must do something.

Mr. Borden, the \$7,000 a year leader of the opposition, alleges that the party will win out in the Ontario bye-elections. As the seats were all conservative before this would indicate a tremendous victory.

The Real Estate Trust company in Philadelphia, a huge concern, went to smash because the directors were ignorant of what was going on. Some day the responsibility of the average director will be established in a very definite way.

The Mail is ashamed of the conservatives who are in sympathy with Mr. Fielding, the finance minister. Some conservatives are ashamed of the Mail and the party which it represents, and they are showing it in a very unmistakable fashion.

A SAD CATASTROPHE

BURNED TO DEATH IN FATHER'S HOUSE.

Miss Aggie Pitt Lost Her Life in Destruction of Fine Residence at Cornwall To-day.

Cornwall, Ont., Aug. 31.—Thursday morning the fine brick residence of Joseph Pitt, Sr., Maple Grove, was discovered to be on fire, and in less than an hour it was a pile of smoldering ruins, in the midst of which lay the body of his daughter, Miss Aggie Pitt. The family were preparing for breakfast, utterly unconscious that when an alarm was given by the men employed at the back of the Cornwall canal. The fire seems to have been due to a spark from the kitchen chimney igniting the shingles of the main building. There was a strong breeze at the time, causing the flames to spread rapidly, and there were no fire-fighting appliances, the building was quickly consumed.

Mrs. E. MacDonald, mother of Mrs. Joseph Pitt, who was visiting her at the first alarm and was rescued in the nick of time by her nephew, John Fletcher. It is thought that Miss Pitt died in the flames, and was overcome by the heat and smoke. She was not missed for some little time, when all chance of a rescue had passed. She was about 17½ years of age.

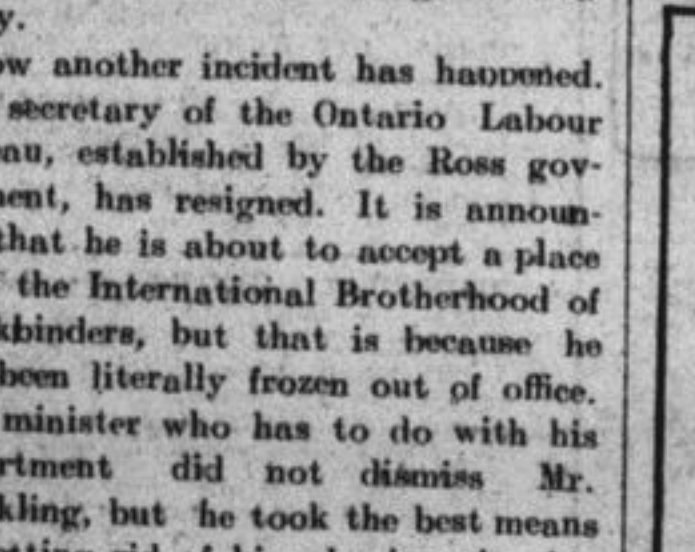
Mr. Pitt's barn, which contained his season's crop, were also destroyed. Both buildings were insured.
