RECORDS OF THE LONGEST PUGILISTIC BATTLES.

'Varsity' Loses Ten of Last Year's Rugby Champions - Two R.M.C. Graduates Will Play With McGill.

Great interest centres in the lacrosse contest this afternoon between Capitals and Montreal.

The Toronto baseball club will finish in last position in the Eastern League is a foregone conclusion.

The Ottawa Capitals, though leading league have secured fewer goals than any other team in the N. U. U. They have tallied fifty.

In Ottawa they have financial success with professional hockey, lacrosse and rugby football, but professional baseball is a dead letter there.

'Jimmy' Craig was elected captain of the Montreal rugby football club. The question of a professional coach was up for discussion, but no definite arrangements have been made so far.

Of thirty extra inning games played in the Eastern League this season, Toronto has participated in twenty. Their sixteen-inning game with Montreal constituted a league record for 1906.

Two of the R. M. C. seniors of last year will be at McGill, and they will be likely candidates for a place on the senior rugby team. Both are now at the science camp at Beaconsfield, one being Hale.

Referee Siler has this to say of the Gans-Nelson contest: "Summed up the fight was a poor one - that is, from a scientific and clean-fighting standpoint. It was simply a fight of endurance, with Bat trying to out-endure the colored man."

Sir Thomas Lipton expects to sail for the Eastern States on September 21st, on the Celtic. He is going to Chicago, but it is said that while in New York he probably will discuss with the committee of the New York Yacht Club the conditions under which he may accept challenge for the America's Cup.

Peterboro rugby teams will be strong. The seniors have Capt. Hurlstone, Crowley, Meagher, Kezan, Dillon, Gilbert, Gillespie, Ford, Mulhern, and Ross Craig. Easton, last year with Brockville, is in the Baly City. Leclair, an old Brockville stalwart may be induced to get into line again.

If a good kicking centre half can be developed the team will be as strong in every department as it was last year.

Toronto University has lost ten of last year's champion rugby team - Ross, Kennedy, Ritchie, Lash, Durbin, Reynolds, Burns, Ross, Davidson, and Johnson. Of last year's aggregation only Montague, Southam, Lailey and McPherson will be back.

Four spare men of last year, Tom, Jackson, Kelly and Hall, also Peter Laing, Christie, Herbert Clarke, Reddick and Cruickshank will be available. Practice will start about September 20th. There is an abundance of good material.

While the Gans-Nelson fight was a long one, it had not many rounds to go before reaching the records of several longer battles, the most notable among them being the famous contest in Chesler, Eng. in 1826, when Jack Jones beat Paty Tunney in 278 rounds. The longest bare knuckle fight recorded in England occurred in 1849, between Mike Madden and Bill Hayes, lasting six hours and three minutes. America's longest bare knuckle fight, four hours and twenty minutes, was fought between J. Fitzpatrick and James O'Neill at Berwick, Me., 1890.

The longest bare knuckle fight on record, took place in Australia, near Melbourne, in 1855, when James Kelly and Jonathan Smith fought six hours and fifteen minutes. A Bowen and J. Burke drew at New Orleans in 1893, after fighting seven hours and nineteen minutes, going 110 rounds.

IS SETTLED BY DUEL.

Gang of Ruffins Fight For Supremacy.

Paris, Sept. 5 - The notorious gang of hoodlums known as the "Fin Blades" recently lost its chief owing to his imprisonment, and there has been a desperate feud between his two lieutenants, who claimed to succeed him.

Alain and Picoi, the lieutenants, succeeded in order to prove their worthiness for the coveted position. But the gang hesitated to decide on their respective merits.

Eventually it was decided that the victor in a duel, which was fought at midnight yesterday on the Boulevard de la Villette. There were to be no seconds, and the only condition was that one of the combatants was to be left on the ground.

The result was known this morning, when Alain was found lying unconscious on the boulevard with a deep wound in his chest. He is now in a critical state at the hospital, and the police are searching for his successful rival.

Swedish Scientists Find It Is Caused By A Layer of Fresh Over Salt Water - Vessels Speed Diminished Therein.

One of the most curious marine phenomena known to seamen is that called by Norwegian sailors "dead water," which, without any visible cause, makes a vessel lose her speed and refuse to answer her helm. The sailor's only definite knowledge of its origin, says the Scotsman, is that it exists solely where there is a surface layer of fresh water resting upon the salt waters of the sea.

Several explanations have been advanced by the captains of ships of the effect of dead water, the commonest of which is that the two water layers move in different directions. The true explanation, however, was recently found by Swedish investigators. At least so it would seem from what follows.

The experiment carried out was an exceedingly pretty one. A large plate glass tank was first mounted on a wooden frame. The tank was then filled to a certain depth with salt water and a layer of fresh water was carefully poured on to the surface, so that two separate water layers were obtained. The salt water was blackened with liquid Chinese ink before the water layers were prepared, and in this way the different layers were made clearly visible. A boat model was then towed along the tank and a silhouette of the waves produced was obtained by placing a white screen at a short distance behind the tank. The waves were also photographed by flashlight.

The results showed conclusively that waves actually were set up at the boundary line between the two liquids.

Further experiments were made to verify the sudden loss of speed due to dead water. The boat model was drawn across the tank and the towing string suddenly slackened when the boat was about half way across. In cases where the tank contained salt water only the boat stopped gradually, moving some lengths after the towing string had been slackened. When the tank contained a layer of fresh water resting on salt water, on the other hand, the boat slackened speed quite suddenly and moved only a very short distance. These experiments, carried out on a small scale, prove conclusively that the difficulties encountered within a dead water zone are really due to the resistance experienced by the vessel in generating invisible waves at the fresh water-salt water boundary, although in some particular cases the influence of undercurrents must also, doubtless, be taken into account.

A Smart Gown. Harris is a salesman. He was in a hotel in Cresson, Pa., in 1899, and Dr. Cummings was a guest in a room opposite. During the night the doctor became very ill and Harris attended him until he was relieved. They met but once afterward, at dinner the following day.

Pittsburg lawyers notified Harris of the death of Dr. Cummings, conveying the information that Harris was heir to the entire estate of the physician, valued at from \$50,000 to \$75,000. Later his brother and two sisters of the doctor here made a contest.

Harris finally decided to accept a compromise, and by agreement with the heirs at law will receive \$13,000. L. B. Fink's roommate, the night the doctor here rendered the physician's services, was left \$1,000. He compromised \$250.
