

Rev. Canon Farthing, for many years, the well known and highly esteemed rector of New St. Paul's, has resigned, and has accepted the rectorship of St. George's cathedral, Kingston, and the deanship of the Ontario diocese. He expects to enter upon his new duties in the fore part of December.

Canon Farthine's action came as a surprise and as a shock to most of his congregation. His announcement of his decision to his congregation Sunday morning, was received with quiet tears and deep sorrow and regret.
While his removal from the congregaration has for some time been not holly unexpected owing to the numerous calls he has received to higher and wider spheres of activity, the offer which he accepted came but a few days ago, and was not generally known. His decision was unknown till Sunday morning, when at the conclusion of the morning service in broken words he addressed his congregation.
