DELEGATES ARRIVING.

Toronto Will Be Given Over to Ogdellows.

Toronto, Sept. 15.—Thousand of Ogdellows are expected in Toronto next week, when the sovereign grand lodge of America meets. For many weeks the committee having charge of the billing arrangements have been busy until, at present, it is thought there will be sufficient accommodation. The various boarding houses in themselves will take care of ten thousand delegates. The city is gayly decorated with flags and hunting welcoming those who follow the three links, and an official welcome will be extended, on Monday, at the parliament buildings. The committee on appeal has been busy since Wednesday and some fifteen appeals have been dealt with. A number of special trains arrived to-day and Sunday with delegates. Nearly one thousand delegates are already in the city.

A QUEER DREAM
