> It is further suggested that in ho tels there should be a fire alarm in every bed-room, and the whole of these alarms should be operative by one touch from the hotel office; there should be a civic fire-alarm box in the office of every good-sized hotel; or at the door, there should be a fire escape at the end of every upstairs corridor of or hall, which opens upon the outer air; it should be compulsory to keep a red light burning all and every night wherever there is a fire escape, or an avenue to one. In new buildings these requirements could be added: Main stairs required in some other position than around the elevator shaft; more than one set of stairs of ways.
