**of Three Column Tariff.**

Ottawa despatches announce great activity by those charged with the revision of the tariff, the purpose being to plunge at once into this subject as soon as parliament assembles in November. As was intimated by Mr. Fielding, last winter, says the St. John Telegraph, a three-column tariff is proposed, with a maximum, minimum and preferential rates, a tariff which will have business features, and patriotic features, which will permit of rewarding tariff friends and dealing with tariff enemies, besides continuing and perhaps increasing the present favors to Britain.

**Prohibition in Maine.**

Prohibition was the great issue before the people of Maine in the election held last week. The republicans had put themselves on record as the defenders of the present prohibition law; the democrats had insisted that the question of the repeal of that law should be submitted to the people. That was practically all there was to the state election.

The result of the balloting shows a heavy republican loss, the candidate for governor being elected by a plurality of about 8,000, as against 26,500 two years ago, the year of a presidential election, and 27,400 four years ago. In gubernatorial elections coming midway between presidential elections the republican plurality in Maine advanced from 8,872 in 1882 to 38,978 in 1894, and then dropped to 21,769 in 1898 and advanced to 27,490 in 1902. These are the figures with which the returns of the election should be compared. The republican plurality in the state is now lower than it has been in a quarter of a century.

**Ontario First.**

Many Ontario journals are given to singing the praises of the west, as a field for settlement; and the comparatively easy conditions of becoming comfortably established as farmers, are a great temptation to the young men of Ontario, who have not the will, if, indeed, they have the stamina, to undergo the hardships their fathers underwent in having a home out of the forest. The lure of the west has been responsible for so much depopulation of parts of Ontario, that the problem of dealing with the situation thus created, has become a serious one, says the Peterboro Examiner. The guardians of provincial interests should discuss some means of checking this drain of population. One cannot be accused of being narrow and sectional in insisting upon some relief from the depopulation under which Ontario is suffering, by the loss of the cream of our young men.

bor in the western harvest fields, thus not only helping to deprive us of our young men, but helping to excite in the latter hopes that will not be fully realized. These young men forget that the high wages quoted, last only for a month or so, and that, on the whole, they will not do as well, nor enjoy as comfortable conditions, as if they had remained on Ontario farms, at a lower, but more continuous, scale of wages. The glamor of western conditions is liable, in some cases, to prove a mirage, representing something less substantial than what they had left behind.

The get-rich-quick microbe infects many of the young men on our farms, as it does the speculator and the capitalist, and, sometimes, there is success, and, sometimes, disappointment—mingled in such proportions, as to counsel to caution. In leaving fairly comfortable conditions, for a betterment, or no change for the better, that would justify deserting the home circle, and the home province, Ontario journals owe their first duty to this province. The west is big enough, and fertile enough, to act as a tempting lure to our young men, without the roseate pictures of Ontario newspapers. The west will grow—is growing—in population, from other sources, and Ontario needs all her own resources of population to cope with the industrial conditions which the expansion of the west creates. We wish the west success, for the more populous it becomes the better for the industrial enterprises which so largely engage our urban population, to the advantage of a home market for farm products, and the consequent advantage of Ontario farmers.

**Editorial Notes.**

The school children are to be used to gather farm statistics for the provincial department of agriculture in Prince Edward Island. A good idea.

The aldermen, who have been succumbing from Dead Man's Bay to Old Orchard are home, with new ideas as to how to boom Kingston. But none can give pointers as to how to clarify the revenue so that their schemes can be carried out.

Mr. Cochrane declares that the Hydro-Electric commission was not ignored by the disposal of the Healey lease. Mr. Cochrane is right, the London Advertiser thinks. Far from being ignored, the commission was hit on the head with an axe.

The Tories of Ontario are calling for the gerrymander in provincial ridings, and "a fairer representation of the people," or in other words for the conservatives. Will they do as the federal government did send the matter over to an impartial commission?

With hotels going up in flames the commercial travellers are requiring as to the equipment carried for easy egress. Where it is not provided the authorities are to be appealed to. Do have it put up. And they will also ask the legislature for further devices for easy escape in times of peril.

So far from liberals being opposed to public ownership, the statistics show that in regard to all public utilities, and as well to various matters not usually so classified, the liberal party has led generously and freely in extending the powers of municipalities.

A surplus, a real surplus, is what is now reported on the Intercolonial railway. The St. John Sun is generous almost to enthusiasm in its references to the reforms wrought during the past year under the administration of the Hon. H. R. Emmerson and his deputy minister, Mr. Butler.

Flags are not good material to feed on; they can be used to demonstrate with under favorable circumstances. In Manitoba, in the wild weather, many a school marm may hurt patriotism when she scoldes between her chattering teeth and as she fumbles with benumbed fingers at the halyards, "Drat that flag!"

The agricultural industry is very backward in the Temiskaming region. The cause of the settlement says the Globe, is the non-resident landholder, and the development of the district will remain more or less paralyzed until he is driven out. He should, never have been allowed to obtain a footing, and the sooner he is compelled to choose between giving up his land and living continuously on it the better.

Bishop Turner, of the African M. E. church, and leader of the movement for negro migration to Africa, has lost none of his bitterness towards the United States, which he calls an "accursed" country. The bishop is engaged in promoting a steamship line from Atlanta, Ga., direct to Monrovia on the west coast of Africa. By means of this line, the bishop believes, the negroes would willingly emigrate to Liberia. In his mind all the hostility toward the negro and all of the lynchings, burnings, and murders of the black men are simply sent by God as plague to drive them out of this country.

**WILL BE NO CHANGE**

**BUT THE RULES WILL BE CAREFULLY REVISED.**

By a Special Committee For Next Conference—Debate on the Superannuation Fund—New Type of Evangelism.

Montreal, Sept. 17.—The governors of Victoria University have not been selected, although the boards for the other educational institutions have been nominated. The education committee has established the principle that hereafter these nominations will be made by a.

A project to have written a history of Methodism was discussed by the book and publishing committee. The discipline of the church regarding desires, dancing and other pastimes will not likely be changed this session. The appointment of a committee of twenty men to canvass the whole issue, revise the rules and report to next general conference is recommended.

The committee on missions is now discussing the division of the office of general secretary, forthcoming from the Anglicans and Baptists, the original negotiations with the Congregationalists and Presbyterians would not be delayed.

The establishment in cities of boarding-house bureaus for girls, who are strangers, employment bureaus for evangelization, that doesn't take a man in the pulpit is urged. The long debate in the superannuation fund committee has concluded. A proposal to place the fund on an actuarial basis as is persistently advocated by Thomas Hilliard, Waterloo, was defeated. It still remains a pension fund.

The committee on Union-church relief fund recommended that the balance of the money in hand, \$15,000, be divided among the different annual conferences according to membership. The fund was organized twenty years ago to help embarrassed churches, and \$77,000 has already been paid out.

The discipline committee had an interesting topic to discuss which related to the allowance made to ministers for keeping their horses. Hitherto the grant made has been \$60 per annum. The committee recommended that the amount be increased to \$100. "This is not much," remarked one member, "when the price of oats and the wear and tear of vehicles are taken into consideration, but I suppose we must be thankful for small mercies."

Much concern is expressed by the members of the conference at the illness of one of the delegates, Rev. E. J. Chegwinn, B.A., Moosejaw, who came to conference as one of the delegates of the Assiniboia conference. Mr. Chegwinn was unwell on his arrival in the city, and his illness has developed into typhoid fever. He now lies in the Homoeopathic hospital.
