#### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

##### What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Midland, Aurora, Wingham, Massey, and Hamilton, Ont., and Dalhousie, N.B., are offering bonds for sale.

C.P.R. traffic continues for the week ending September 14th, 1905, \$1,371,000 for the same period last year, \$1,045,000. Increase \$326,000.

The New York Central lines will give the best of equipment, an order for cars and engines amounting to \$25,000,000, for delivery in 1907.

The Montreal Power company will be lighting the end of the year, low the street lighting of Westmount, a suburb of Montreal, which is building a municipal plant.

The exportation of U.S. manufactured goods was higher in 1905 than in any other year, aggregating practically \$54,000,000, against \$30,000,000 in 1902 and \$22,500,000 in 1904.

United States Steel Foundries for year ending July 31st, total income, \$1,209,483; charges and depreciation, \$387,483; surplus, \$1,000,000, compared with a deficit on July 31st, 1905, of \$114,000.

Australia, to which United States bankers are turning to get gold, since the Bank of England cut up its deposits, sent out \$88,800,000 specie and \$10,000,000 in 1904, and \$26,950,000 in 1905. In 1904, the United States received \$5,000,000 gold from Australia and \$29,750,000. In 1905, England got \$17,000,000 and the United States only a paltry \$1,625.

#### THE HARBOUR SHOAL

##### Is of Benefit to Mariners Says Capt. Scott.

Capt. J. H. Scott, late captain of the steamer Persia, in speaking this morning of recent accidents to vessels, pointed out what a benefit the shoal, better known as the "Cann Shoal," which fronts the harbor between Swift's wharf and Craig's wharf, is to the marine interests of this city. The shoal, Capt. Scott claims, acts as a natural breakwater to the front, and without it the harbor of Kingston, in that special vicinity, would not always be as calm and serene as it is. In his estimation it is superior to the one constructed by the United States government at Cape Vincent.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 18.—Mayor Cawwell, Toronto, who attended the big Cawwells family reunion at Kingsville, last week, said that the journey showed him that some of the railroads, operating in Canada, have failed to keep pace with the development of the country. Mayor Cawwell said he had no hesitation in saying that the accommodations are inadequate, and that something should be done at once to remedy the existing state of affairs and that when the house convenes he will ask the Toronto representatives to investigate the matter.

### HORTICULTURE SHOW

#### IS BEING HELD AT THE ARMOURIES.

The Exhibits Are Better Than Heretofore—Potted Plants Shown By Rockwood Asylum and the Penitentiary.

The Kingston Horticultural show opened at the armouries this afternoon, and was favored with real summer weather. On the whole, the exhibits are considered ahead of those of the past two years, both in quantity and quality. The arrangement of the exhibits is also considered better. A visit to the show is worth the time of all those who take an interest in horticulture.

While the exhibit of cut flowers is not so large as previously, on account of the dry weather, the display of plants generally is first-class. The market gardeners have very fine floral displays. John Marsh has an exceptional fine exhibit of ferns, and R. E. Kent, as an exhibitor, flower grower, excels in dahlias. Rockwood asylum and the penitentiary have on exhibition grand displays of potted plants and vegetables, not entered for competition, however. There are more than heretofore. The Horticultural Society is trying to interest amateur growers to exhibit, and when the number is sufficient, the professionals will be left out. This year there is no distinction between amateur and professional in the prize list.

The vegetable and fruit display is very fine, notwithstanding the drought. It would be hard to find a better selection of fruit and vegetables after the judging was done, and this evening those attending the show will be able to see the results of the judges' work.

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#### ROUTES OF NEW C.P.R. LINE.

The C.P.R. engineer, Mr. Arlugh, visited Brockville in surveying for a new route from Montreal to Toronto. After looking over the ground he decided that it would be impossible to run the north side of the Grand Trunk without tunneling, which would be impracticable. The proposed line will run from Prescott to Brockville on the north side of the G.T.R., but just west of here will cross to the south, running along south of Mallorytown and Lansdowne, touching Gananoque that is now three miles from the G.T.R., and also getting inside the G.T.R. at Kingston.

#### GROVER FLIM-FLAMMED.

##### Gave Goods and Money For a Worthless Cheque.

Another flim-flam name of the cheque variety was successfully worked here on Thursday evening. Mr. Corkey, grocer, on returning from the Wolfe Island fair, was waited upon by a young man who wished to make some purchase. The latter bought \$9.00 worth of goods, and requested that they be sent to the K. & P. railway station in the morning. In payment he gave Mr. Corkey a cheque for \$25 on the Standard Bank and received \$16.10 in change. The cheque was made payable to Horace Ames or bearer, and signed by Randolph Ames, Jr.

This morning when Mr. Corkey presented the cheque at the bank it was refused, as one of the name having money on deposit there. Mr. Corkey then notified the police. He described the young man as about five feet eight inches in height, wearing a dark suit of clothes and had a probably about twenty or twenty-two years of age.

The police found that such a young man had been at the Windsor Hotel last night, and that he left at 5 a.m., without paying his board bill. It is thought that he took the steamer Kingston to Clayton. He left behind him a horse which he purchased at Steele's Bay from W. Metcalfe, and for which he gave one of his hand-made cheques, and got a little cash to make up the difference. Mr. Metcalfe has yet to present his cheque at the Standard Bank. The flim-flam fellow also purchased a Buick from W. Lemmon of this city, but it was not delivered until the cash would be forthcoming.

Was Electrocuted.

Oswego, N.Y., Sept. 19.—While working in the boiler at the Minetto Shade (Toth) factory, yesterday, Joseph M. Gans was killed by an electric shock. Gans went into the boiler carrying with him an electric light, the cord of which was wound around his neck and the current entered his body, causing instant death. Dr. Jones was called, but his efforts to restore the victim were of no avail.

Gans was about thirty years old. He is survived by his widow and three children.

Hewitt, 1st Royal Regiment, who died at Northampton, Mass., were buried from St. Mark's church, Niagara-on-the-Lake. The choir and ladies' guild, of which Miss Hewitt was a member, were present at the service. Pere Hewitt, her brother, was at the funeral.

##### Affairs At Cobalt.

Mr. Miller states that the Cobalt boom has practically collapsed to the detriment of a great many people. Good investments, however, are being made in the vicinity. #### APPEAL TO KING

##### To Stop Dreadful Carnage Among Jews.

London, Sept. 12.—The Zionist Central organization, at Cologne, has telegraphed to King Edward saying that the military authorities at Siedice have arranged a "dreadful carnage among the Jews; 200 of whom have been arrested without warrants. They will be tried summarily forthwith and are likely to be condemned to death in order to justify the recent slaughter of Holnswa in that town. The telegram implores his majesty to use his influence at Petrohoff, to prevent this wholesale judicial murder.
