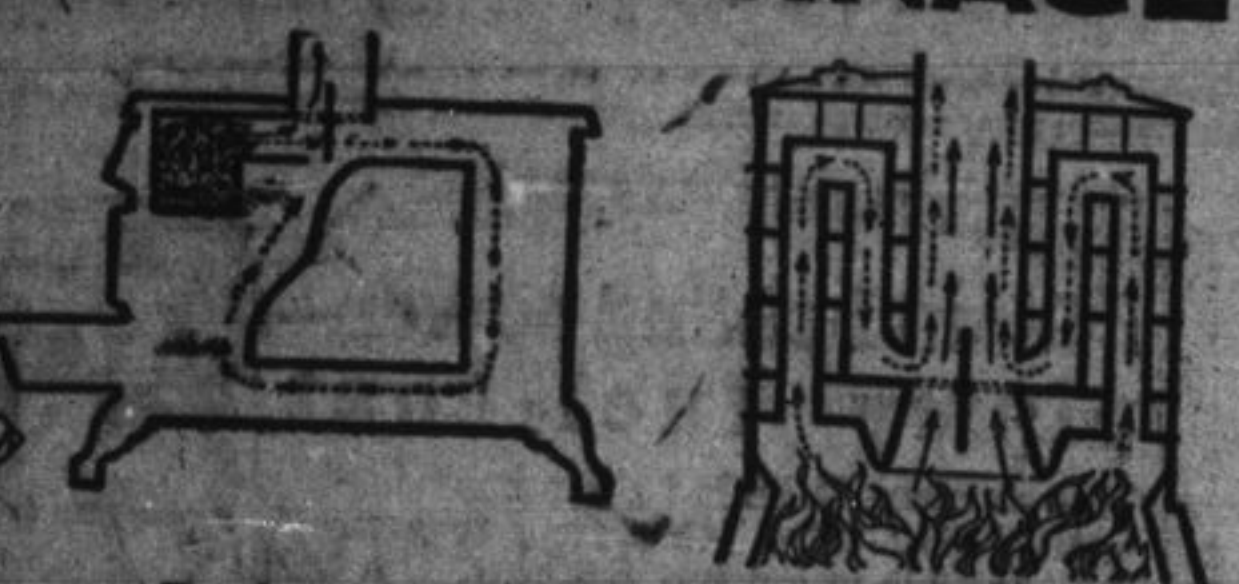

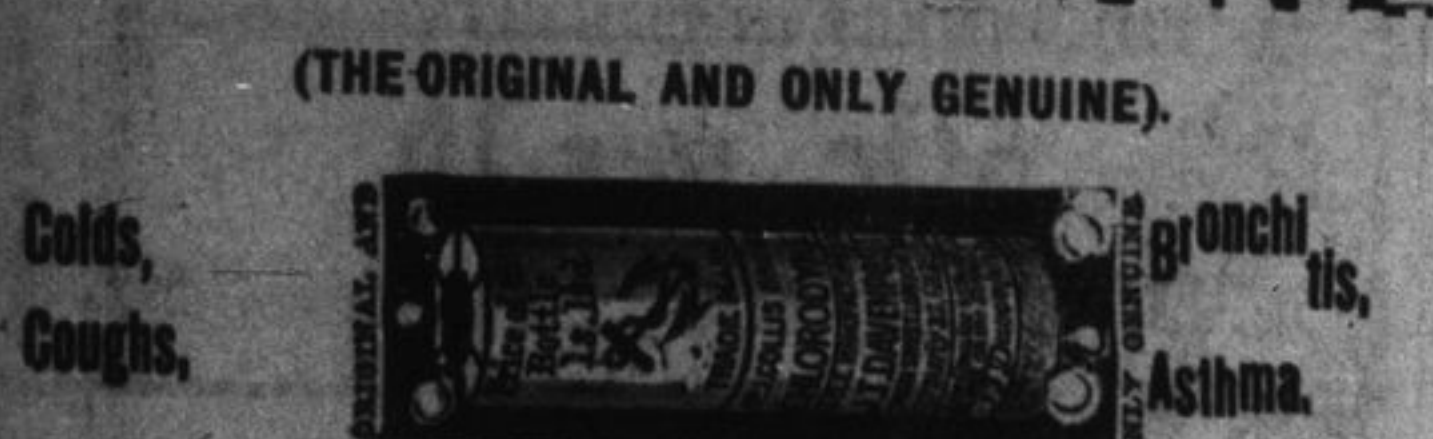

Quebec, Sept. 18.—A. G. Gier, M.P. P. for Rouville, president of the Quebec electric light and power, and director of the Quebec and Saguenay electric light enterprise, started to-day, from Quebec on a tour of inspection over the new railroad at Malbaie. The construction of the new road is being promoted by a syndicate of investors, Quebec, Montreal and Toronto capitalists, who have assumed full responsibility for the cost, \$1,500,000, which will include the electrical equipment and rolling stock of the road.
