Hartford, Conn., Sept. 24.—Individual losses on account of the San Francisco catastrophe have nearly all been paid by the fire insurance companies incorporated in Connecticut. Hartford companies have paid out to date \$15,952,749, the gross amount of the claims being about 6 per cent. more.

Police Exploded Bomb.

Tiflis, Sept. 21.—During a demolition of suspected houses the police discovered in the apartment of a young man named IFALLI, a box containing a powerful explosive. Directly the box was touched it exploded and two detective inspectors and an assistant commissary of police were killed and three injured, and a soldier and policeman were wounded. The floor of the apartment collapsed, splinters injuring a mother and her child in the room below. The uncharged explosive was found in the apartment. Two men and two women were arrested.

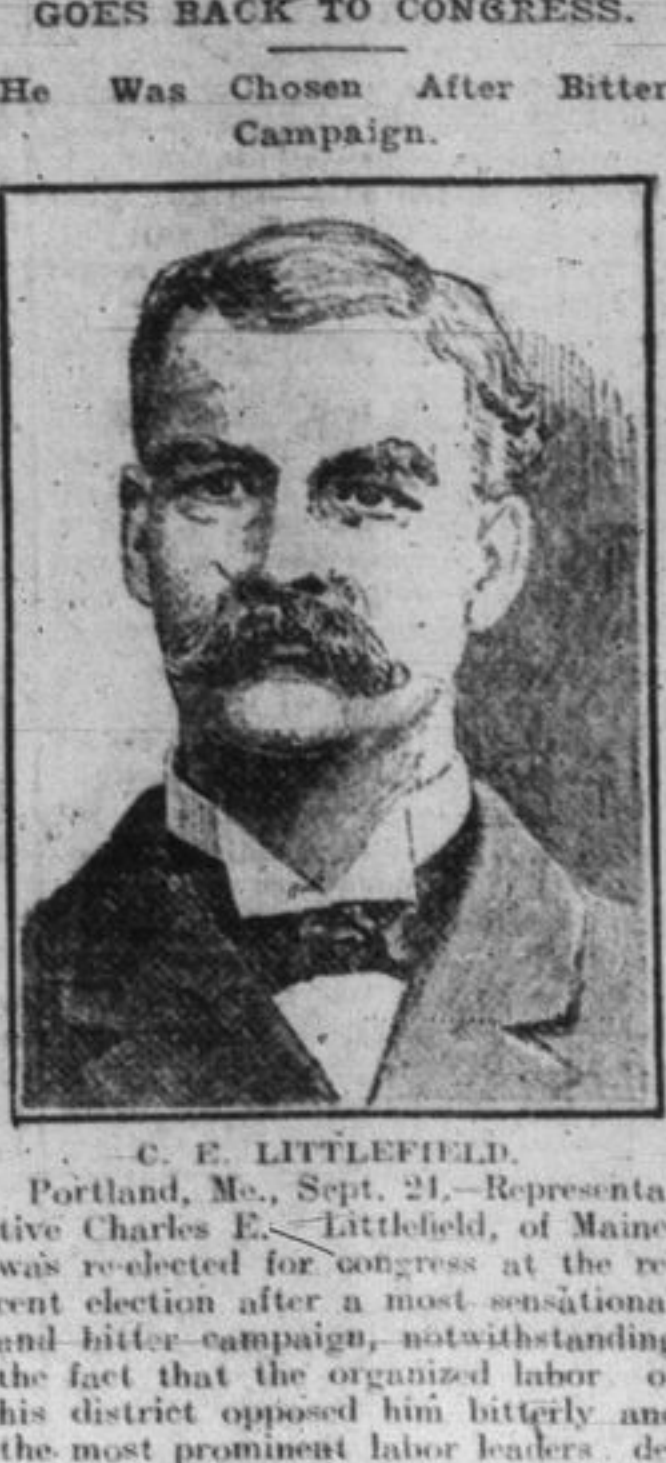
