### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

#### What is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

The trustees of the small slate estate have sold the P.H. slate mine to the Southern railway, between St. John and St. Thomas, subject to arrival of the bill into the state legislature.

This leads to other States in the production of slate. The slate estate is worth \$1,000,000, and the slate is being shipped to various points, and is being used elsewhere.

The time is now 125,000,000 pounds having a value of \$70,000,000.

The Tennessee Coal & Iron Company has been called in Tracy City, for a meeting of stockholders to protest against the manner in which the convention was held, Saturday, when G. E. Amy was nominated.

Pilots arriving from Montreal, yesterday afternoon, report the barque "Bella" adrift above Three Rivers.

The annual dividend paid to shareholders for the year to \$6,748,000, which is about \$1,000,000 less than last year.

John Moore, a member of Prescott cotton staff, and a fishery overseer, is dead, aged eighty-two. He was a conservative.

Rev. N. A. McDermid of Madoc, died on Saturday. He was Metho-

distic minister, recently stationed at Nazareth and Princeton.

James Lovelace, Kingville, Ont., aged eight-four years, one of the oldest of the Essex county pioneers, is dead. He was born in Quebec in 1825.

The attendance at McGill, this year, is to be a record one. Already the number are beyond those of last year and records are still going on.

Three men were killed and six injured in a collision between a freight train and a work train on the Cincinnati and Muskegon Valley, at Rock Cut, Ohio.

Twelve were killed Saturday morning while working at Bankhead mine, Bell, N.W. Seventy tons of coal fell on the unfortunate men while

they were at work.

The St. Catharines police got a stirring up, from Judge Carman, who declared that from the way they ignor-

ed wrong-doing, they must be both dead and blind.

"R. P. J. Smith, who once

presided at Tarenton and sold mining stock, which purchasers believe now to be worthless, is reported to be in jail at San Quentin, Cal.

The hydrographic office of the geological survey, Washington, is preparing to begin the work of investigating the quality of the water carried in the Great Lakes.

George W. Atkinson, attorney of Ogdensburg, has entered a notice for \$10,000 damages against James Bain of that city for a personal reflection in connection with the trial of a case.

The \$400,000 income of the Methodist Missionary Society, this year,
