SHOT IN THE TEMPLE  
A TRAGEDY DISCLOSED IN MONTREAL.

A Man Found Dead—Cards Had Evidently Been Indulged In—The Police Will Investigate.

Montreal, Sept. 25.—Montrealers have been the victims of a series of swindles within the past few weeks, and another one of the wholesale variety was disclosed today. A successful swindler, using the name John Garvey, has flooded the city with bogus cheques of small denominations, making in the aggregate a considerable sum. Garvey either stole, or had a counterfeit rubber stamp made of the Harris Abbotter company, doing business at Bonsecours market, which he used on the cheques, simply filling in the name of John Garvey. The firm being well known, the cheques, ranging in amount from \$10 to \$50, were accepted in payment by purchasers, and the difference in cash handed over. Garvey did not stop there, but they were ordered sent to fictitious addresses. This led to the discovery of the fraud. No such person as Garvey is known here.

An unknown man was found dead, early today, in the bedroom of a house on Chatham street, in the west end, near the C.T.R. tracks, with a bullet hole in the right temple. The body was covered with a blanket, and the revolver with which the shot was evidently fired was found under a bed in an adjoining room. A half dozen Italian families of the poorer class, who inhabited the house had fled. Cards were scattered over the floor and prior to the tragedy a game had evidently been in progress. Whether murder was committed is a matter of police investigation. The man may have been killed as the result of a dispute, but it is also said that he may have shot himself and the incriminating circumstances may have been due to the fact of the other occupants of the house and their desire to escape trouble.

WEARING AN END.

Enlarging the Scope of the League.  
Montreal, Sept. 25.—The general conference is drawing near, and this morning was spent largely in re-creating discipline to accord with legislation already passed. Two resolutions of importance were, however, adopted. The first broadened the scope of Epworth League work to include athletics and the second declared for a common university in British Columbia, governmental or independent, but which was not to be a branch of McGill.

BOILERMAN DEAD.

Passed away at Brampton, on Wednesday.  
Brampton, Ont., Sept. 25.—Kenneth Chisholm, county registrar, died this morning, aged 77 years. For thirty-five years he was one of the most prominent merchants outside of Toronto, the firm of K. Chisholm & Co., with headquarters at Brampton, doing a very large business as general storekeepers, grain buyers and millers. They were also owners of large quarries at the forks of the Credit, from which the celebrated Credit Valley stone was taken. The parliament buildings in Toronto, amongst many others, were built of stone from these quarries.

Mr. Chisholm, always a strong liberal, was elected member of the legislative assembly for Ontario in 1878, on the death of the sitting member, the late John Coyn, and represented the county of Peel continuously until his resignation in 1883. In that year he was appointed registrar of his county, and remained in his office till death. Mr. Chisholm leaves three sons and two daughters.  
Mr. Chisholm's death was due to a stroke of paralysis. He had been gradually sinking for the past two months.

MANSE BURNED

And Occupants Escaped in Night Robes.  
Omeha, Ont., Sept. 25.—The Presbyterian manse, here, was badly damaged by fire this morning, shortly after twelve o'clock. Rev. Mr. Whitelaw and his family were awakened by the smoke and had narrow escapes, most of them getting out in their night robes. The fire was confined to the kitchen which was destroyed. Loss \$1,500, insured.

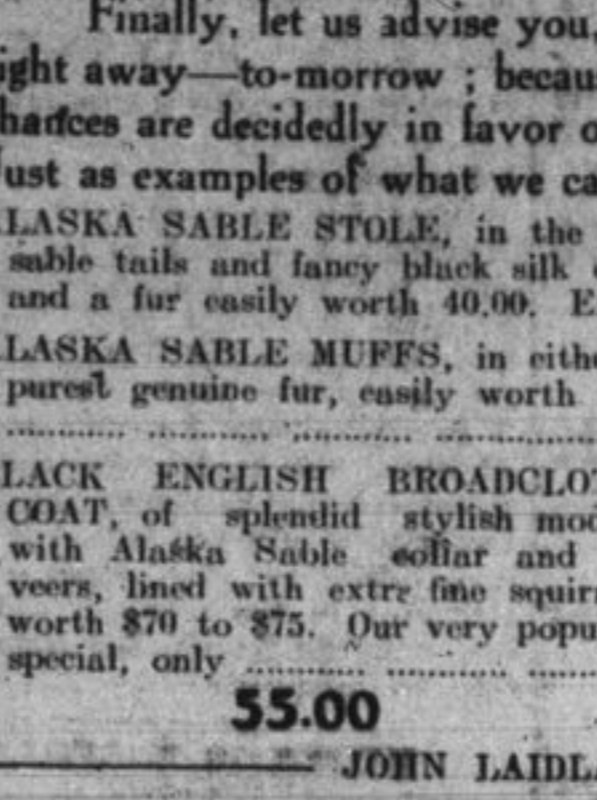

REBELLIOUS NATIVES.

British Having Trouble in Southern Nigeria.  
Lagos, West Africa, Sept. 25.—The traders in the City of Benin, Southern Nigeria, have been compelled to flee because of a rising of the natives. Two Europeans have been killed. The British have had considerable trouble lately on account of the machinations of a native society called the "Silent Ones," the business of which is to incite the natives to rebellion. Last month a British force compelled the surrender of a rebellious tribe, which had killed a British commissioner and had defeated, with heavy loss, a column that had been sent to punish them.
