YALE FREE OF DEBT.

Gifts to University Endowment and Extension.

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 28.—Yale University is free of floating debt for the first time in several years.

The gifts for the year to the university endowment and extension fund approximate \$2,000,000, including \$1,000,000 from John D. Rockefeller; \$187,500 from Edward S. Harkness; and \$100,000 from the Jennings family.

The par value of stocks and bonds held by the university is \$3,808,454, while the present market value is \$250,000 greater.
