AN EARTHQUAKE SHOCK

Felt at San Juan, Porto Rico
Yesterday.

Sanduan, Porto Rico, Sept. 28.—An earthquake shock, lasting half a minute, was felt, yesterday morning. The people,惊异, were惊异, in Francisco and Valparaiso, becoming panic-stricken, and rushed into the streets and public squares.

The first shock which was slight, occurred at 10.47. Other shocks followed increasing in force, reaching their maximum intensity in twenty seconds, after which they diminished and gradually stopped ten seconds later. The motion was first backward and forward, followed by a terrific upward and downward plunge.

RIVALS NIAGARA FALLS.

South America Has Catastrophe
Claimed By Three Republics.

In the heart of South America, at the meeting place of the three republics, Brazil, Argentina and Paraguay, Nature has chosen the site for a masterpiece of scenic grandeur to be compared only to the mighty Niagara in majesty and pronounced by some of the few travellers who have seen it to be even greater than its North American counterpart.

The Falls of Iguazu are the junction of the Iguazu river with the upper Paraná, a territory famous for the original locality of the Jesuit missions established in the sixteenth century, the ruins of which may still be seen by those who visit the falls. In the course of the upper Paraná there are many notable waterfalls, but none of the others equal the magnificence of the Iguazu. Until recently the inaccessibility of the region made it difficult for the traveller to bear the fatigues and discomforts of many days' journey across the pampas and through the forest, under the blaze of a tropical sun, but now that the Argentine government has recognized the importance of opening up this route regular excursions take many visitors to Iguazu.

The Iguazu is a series of cataracts, a clear leap in an enormous sheet of water twenty feet thick over a precipice varying from 150 to 180 feet in height. Above the falls is a broad expanse of river, while below is a narrow gorge through which the water is forced in a rapid torrent. The Falls of Iguazu offer a notable contrast to Niagara, inasmuch as the former is caused by the river making a sharp bend in the main volume of water rushes around the inner bank and is discharged into a long, narrow gorge, at one point making a plunge of 210 feet. Not all the volume of the river, is received at this place, however, the rest of the water running out past into the white elbow formed by the forest, under the blaze of a tropical sun, but now that the Argentine government has recognized the importance of opening up this route regular excursions take many visitors to Iguazu.

Quebec, Sept. 28.—Rev.
