AT QUEEN'S GOES UP WITH EACH PRACTICE.

Speedy, Light and Young is the Team's Back Division—Two Yankee Candidates For a Place—"Bill" Kennedy May Be All Right.

Two good teams opposing one another, the players all chuck full of enthusiasm and work, and the older heads coaching throughout the practice.

Conditions such as these were responsible for the crowd which lined the field, yesterday afternoon, and discussed the chances which the fates hold in store when two weeks from now the representatives of the old tri-color line up for their first battle on the gridiron.

In the half line, the boys named are Fraser, Williams and Cooke. The former is an ex-McGill player, and is taking hold nicely.

Williams, in the centre, continues to improve and will become famous before the series are at an end.

His stronghold lies in running and kicking.

Ernie Cooke, at right half, is an old Limestone player, and one of the hardest workers on the campus.

He has travelled the round a few, and the man who tries to pass him in the grip of his hands is never again seen.

"Buck" Crawford, last year's quarter, is as good as ever. He is slightly heavier than last fall, and a more vigorous leader.

So much for the back division. Speedy, light, and young, it may yet make some of the old ones look up a bit.

On the line, as usual, all the best of material. One of the most promising wing men is Buck. An old association player he has speed to burn, and the use of a prop, at hot.

His chances of figuring on the "ing line are good. The most noticeable figure, however, is Hugh Macdonell.

Tried on the back division, last year, he has been a revelation. He has a fine line this fall.

Last fall, Turner was his reputation as an outside wing in the intercollegiate Union, and needless to say we are disappointed his loss would be keenly felt.

Low and black, Capt. "Bill" Kennedy, the hero of the calamity in Ottawa, where he sought to tackle a street car to aid him in shaping into practice, is not a forlorn hope yet, and the consensus of opinion is that he will be able to do the moleskins before long.

The surprise of the afternoon dropped with a bump yesterday, when George Richardson walked on the campus in full football attire.

He worked at quarter and at half, and put the boys onto many tricks.

Indeed, the difference he created in the snap and ginger of the practice was perceptible.

Of his ability as a charger of the pigskin, no comment need be made, but the main question worrying the "sideline" is whether he intends to enter college this fall.

His presence, last evening, was the result of a promise to do what he could to help his old team mates along, but there is a strong probability that he will be back at college again this session.

At any rate here's hoping he will for they need him.
