

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
STONERoad REGULATIONS,**
for Coal Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting N. & S., not
less than 100 acres, and not more than 1000 acres,
between the said land or in family, to the extent of
one-half acre, or less, to the extent of
one-half acre, or less.

An application for homestead entry or
homestead entry in connection with an
application at the office of the local Agent
or Commissioner for entry or location
may be filed at any time during the year.
An application for entry or location
made personally at any Agent's office
may be wired to the local Agent by
telegraph, and the Agent will file it
promptly, if the land applied for is
except on receipt of the telegram
that the land has been granted, and the
land will be held until the necessary
powers to complete the transaction are
granted.

In case of "non-payment" the entry may
be surrendered or abandoned, and the applica-
tion for location or entry must be
surrendered or abandoned, and the application
for entry or location may be filed again
unless the original application has been
received from an individual until that
application has been discharged.

If an application for entry or location
is surrendered or abandoned, it may be
reopened for entry or location, but the
original application for entry or location
must be filed again unless the original
application has been received from an
individual.

Where an entry is surrendered
or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to
the filing of the application for location
the application for location will be
entitled to prior rights of entry.

An application for location must be
submitted to the Commissioner to be
granted, and if subsequently the state-
ment is made to the Commissioner
in writing, that the application for entry or
location, or both, has been granted, the
application for location will be rejected
unless the Commissioner has been created
by such person residing with the
father or mother.

The father or mother has his permanent
residence upon the land, and he resides
in the vicinity of his homestead,
and the son and he resided by
confidence in the father.

Before making application for patent
on the land, the holder must give six
months notice to the Commissioner
of the name of the town or city of
Ottawa, of his intention to apply for
a patent.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**

Coal—Coal lands may be purchased at
\$10 per acre for coal and \$20 for
lignite, and the same may be acquired by
purchase or lease by one individual or
company. Royalty on the rate of ton
or cubic yard of coal or lignite shall be
collected on the severance cuttings.

Quartz—A true mining certificate is
granted for quartz land, and the same is
given for an individual, and from
\$20 to \$100 per annum for a company
having discovered mineral
values, may receive a claim 1,500
sq. miles.

The fee for recovering a claim is \$5,
and from \$10 must be expended on the
claims before they can be sold to the
mining company. The \$1000 has
been expended or paid, the locator may
make application for a patent, and
complying with other requirements, pur-
chase the land at \$1 per acre.

Gold—A true mining certificate is
granted for gold land, and the same is
given for an individual, and from
\$20 to \$100 per annum for a company
having discovered mineral
values, may receive a claim 1,500
sq. miles.

The fee for recovering a claim is \$5,
and from \$10 must be expended on the
claims before they can be sold to the
mining company. The \$1000 has
been expended or paid, the locator may
make application for a patent, and
complying with other requirements, pur-
chase the land at \$1 per acre.

Platinum—A true mining certificate is
granted for platinum land, and the same is
given for an individual, and from
\$20 to \$100 per annum for a company
having discovered mineral
values, may receive a claim 1,500
sq. miles.

The fee for recovering a claim is \$5,
and from \$10 must be expended on the
claims before they can be sold to the
mining company. The \$1000 has
been expended or paid, the locator may
make application for a patent, and
complying with other requirements, pur-
chase the land at \$1 per acre.

A free miner may obtain two leases to
drill for oil and gas, and the same is
for a term of twenty years renewable at
the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

Oil—A lease may be obtained for
drilling for oil and gas, and the same is
for a term of twenty years renewable at
the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

Royalty—The rate of 24 per cent
collected on the output after \$1 ex-
ceeds \$10,000.
