BELLS WERE TOLLED WHILE THE REMAINS OF LATE FATHER O'GORMAN

Passed Through the Streets of Gananoque—Remains Conveyed to Howe Island in Charles Macdonald's Steam Yacht.

Gananoque, Oct. 3.—The funeral of the late Rev. Father John D. O'Gorman took place at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The services at the church, where the body lay in state since Wednesday, was conducted by Archbishop Gauthier. The priests from all over Kingston diocese, were present to pay their last respect to the deceased. The A.O.H. and U.M.W.A. attended in a body, and a large number of prominent citizens of the town were also in the cortege. Charles Macdonald kindly put his private yacht, the Kate, at the disposal of those in charge of the funeral to convey the body to Howe Island, for burial. The remains were taken to the island, also many motor launches, forming a procession by water as well as by land. The bells of the Protestant churches as well as the alarm bell were tolled, the procession was under way. Rev. J. R. Scott, pastor of Christ church, Rev. Henry Gracey, pastor of St. Andrew's church, and Rev. William Timberlake, of Grace church, all attended, being conveyed to Howe Island in George Taylor's launch, Apohaqui. The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in Gananoque.

A Trip to the Highlands was the attraction at the opera house last evening, drawing a fairly good house. In the police court yesterday Charles Clark was arraigned before Police Magistrate Healy on a charge of being drunk and disorderly and was fined \$2 and costs. Edward Gagnon, for a like offence received the same fine.

BOSTON HAD ITS DOSE.

History of Municipal Ownership Where It Flourished.

Look! Boston out of the municipal ownership movement. The reason is that Boston had a bad attack a little less than ten years ago. Everything that could be done by the city (those of raising money) was done by the city. The city had its own construction plant (for taking care of work on public buildings, ferryhouse and everything else owned by the city), but the water department also did all the city's electrical wiring work. We had municipal carriage establishments, municipal blacksmith establishments, municipal carpenter shops, and all work on the streets, to the smallest detail, was done by the city, further, merely laying the streets, but all incidental work. Of course we had the municipal printing plant. We had the municipal ice plants, ice houses, ice teams, municipal fire water establishments, and so on through the whole list. No city in the new world ever went so thoroughly into public ownership as Boston did. Few cities in the old world were more so.

From the statements of the wonderful saving accomplished by the city's doing its own work almost took one's breath away—until the experts got to work on the books, and the heads of the departments were obliged to give up the facts, rather than fancy. The result of the experts' investigations all of us know.

From the statement of skilled workmen who held high places in some of these bureaus, but were powerless to do much in the way of correcting abuses, a few figures are worth quoting. Bookkeeping up the cost of material at the current quotations, at that time, and the probable cost of labor necessary to do the work under the supervision of an inexperienced contractor or business house in Boston, they found that a job of electrical equipment on the ferriesboats operated by the city should have cost \$6,500. As a matter of record, it actually cost \$10,200. The electrical work on a city building for hospital nurses should have cost less than \$2,000, but the city had to pay nearly \$6,700 for the job. Some work on a public school, estimated as likely to cost \$1,471 if done under contract, cost the city about \$3,600.

Meanwhile investigations were being pushed in other directions. The city's ice plant made an inviting field. After the city had finished figuring on that public spirited enterprise. It was found that the ice used by the water department in the drinking fountain cost about \$60 a ton, but the market price for the same quality of ice was \$2 or \$3 a ton. Orders were immediately given to get rid of the ice plant on the best terms possible, lest the outrage thus created might weaken Boston's credit if the plant should be in operation for much longer. If a customer could have been found for the municipal printing plant that too might have been sold at once. Some investigations into the cost of the operation of the plant indicated that outside parties would have done its work at twenty-five per cent. below the price actually charged, and would certainly have done much better work. In short, Boston unloaded its "municipally owned" plants for whatever they would bring. No matter how heavy the loss, it plainly could not be as great as would have been the drain caused by keeping up those departments. Boston has had its lesson. It is not likely ever to repeat the blunder, until the costly experience of the last decade has been utterly forgotten.

Died in Lion, N.Y.
