**TO ASK A CHANGE IN REGULATIONS GOVERNING SCHOLARSHIPS.**

Matters Considered at the Meeting of the Board of Education—Glad the Teachers Had Taken the Trip to Toronto.

The Board of Education, at its meeting last night, decided to ask the city council if the pupils of the Collegiate Institute were receiving all the Queen's University scholarships they were entitled to. Three were granted to Kingston pupils this year, the Queen's University announcements for 1907 say four scholarships are to be given under terms with the city council, and Messrs. Groves and Thompson said that the late Principal Grant had publicly stated, when the city was asked to grant \$30,000 to the university, that double the number of scholarships would be granted. R. Meek said the documents the council held did not name any more than had been awarded; if there were more than from should be asked to secure them.

In this connection it was also agreed to ask the council to change its regulations for next year, so that the scholarships would be available for all pupils taking partial and full matriculation. This year the awards were given to Kingstonians having the highest marks at the "full matriculation" examinations in each year; this barred out pupils who took the examinations for the fourteen subjects in two parts, taking two years to do the work. It was thought that pupils who took two years to cover the full matriculation work, might be better equipped for university work than those covering all the work in one year.

It was also felt that the council did not wish to limit the scope of the work, but its desire was to have the awards made on full, rather than partial matriculation work, but their regulation was more restrictive than was anticipated. There was generally good feeling at the meeting and considerable pleasure was indulged in. Those attending were Messrs. W. Kelly (chairman), W. G. Anglin, E. Bennett, J. G. Elliott, W. H. Godwin, P. From J. W. Robertson, stating that as Mr. Gibson's engagement with the Macdonald firm closes with the school garden period of the present summer, he was unable to arrange for him to come to Kingston for the model school term—Management.

From James G. Goodwin, asking for a hearing before the managing committee regarding trouble at Frontenac school in which his son is implicated—Management.

From W. Farrell Doyle, secretary of the Collegiate athletic committee, asking the board to give a grant towards athletics in the institute—Finance.

**To Use a Card System.**  
The management committee's report awarded contracts to Thomas McAuley for water colors and to E. Uglow & Co. for supplementary reading books, and appointed Miss Laura Nesh as kindergarten teacher. The card system was considered. By it much information touching the life and characteristics of the pupils would be available. The board adjourned final action until the finance committee gave the cost. Messrs. Meek, Elliott and Lambert thought the system very much to be approved, while Messrs. Bennett and Thompson thought it savored too much red tape and would be speedily abandoned.

The committee said it was considering the establishment of departments of domestic science and manual training. The Y.M.C.A. wanted to get a teacher of domestic science and asked for school pupils at \$35 a month until the system was put in the schools. The matter was reviewed and the opinion was expressed that as the new departments were likely to come into existence in January next, it would not be wise to go into association with the Y.M.C.A. for the brief period. The ladies sent in lengthy petitions from mothers and others, asking that their children be given instruction in the art in the public schools and the board expressed pleasure at such evidence of interest. A motion, moved by J. D. Thompson and seconded by T. Lambert, to grant the request of the Y.M.C.A. was defeated out of order as the finance committee had not reported funds available for the purpose.

The members while heartily approving of the visit of the teachers to Toronto, were not so minded as the management committee giving the teachers leave of absence. Mr. Thompson thought the board should have been consulted. However, as the teachers had not thought of the trip until after the September meeting and they wished to go before October

**ABANDONED CHARGE AGAINST A PROFESSOR FOR ILLEGAL FISHING.**

After His Testimony That He Did Not Exceed the Limit the Counsel For the Prosecution Withdrawn the Various Charges.

County Magistrate Hunter dismissed the charge made against Prof. Iva Martin by Fishery Overseer James H. Brickwood, at Portsmouth Thursday afternoon. The charges against Francis Macee and William Kent were withdrawn. The trio were accused of unlawfully catching and having in their possession more black bass than right in one day. The only evidence taken was that of Prof. Martin, but eleven witnesses had been summoned and were present. Prof. Martin pleaded not guilty. To the court he stated that he remembered fishing in Lake Ontario on July 13th last. He said that he caught six or seven bass, but swore that he had not taken more than seven. He admitted that he caught more, but stated that he had thrown them back into the water. The fish were small, and the witness stated that he never killed small fish. Witness further stated that the yacht used for the occasion was owned by Angus Macdonell. A skiff was also used for fishing purposes. He was aware of the fact that one could not catch more than eight bass in one day.

When questioned, witness said that it was dark when he landed, and he did not know what kind of a catch Messrs. Macdonell and Redden had made.

George Comper was called as a witness, but before he was sworn Fishery Overseer Brickwood and his counsel, John L. Whitting, K.C., announced that they would not proceed, and the charge was accordingly dismissed.

As the result of a row at Portsmouth, on Monday, George de St. Remy, aged fifteen, is lying ill at his home there, and Percy Asselstine, aged twenty-seven, also of Portsmouth, will be charged with assault. He will be arraigned before County Magistrate Hunter.
