SCENERY IN HAWAII?

The Islands Are Nothing But Scenery.

That the Hawaiian Islands are rich in scenery is not the thing to be said of them. The truth is that they are all scenery, and that the grandest, most varied kinds, rivaling no other spot on the earth's surface. There are no plain or monotonous areas in this group. Here one is never apart from the immediate proximity of mountain and ocean in endlessly varied combinations. A peculiarity of all these islands is the continual change in the topography and combination of scenery. These forms seldom seem to repeat themselves. One can travel but a few miles on any island without opening fresh and wonderful combinations of grandeur and beauty. For example, the three or four hours' ride down the railway from Honolulu will give on every half hour an entirely fresh arrangement of striking scenery, each quite unlike all the others. A chief element in this variety of impressive formations lies in the fact of a regular graduation in the ages of the five principal islands, so that the weathering of mountains has developed in different degrees of form which are less or more advanced. These islands lie in a chain stretching 300 miles from north-west to south-west. The oldest islands are at the north end, while at the south-eastern extremity of the vast bulk of Manua Loa is still in process of upbuilding. Hence the north-east is down by the sketch, the trimming consisting of bridling, lace and velvet ribbon and buttons.
