**Result Of A Gamble.**

The directors of the Ontario Bank have been humiliated and depressed by the collapse of a public institution. A large banking business is not picked up in a day. It is the result of persistent and patient toil of the part of many workers, and those led and inspired by the local self-sacrificing managers. It is a scandal that while the Ontario Bank was apparently succeeding so well—while it was enlarging its boundaries and becoming annually the medium through which a larger number of tradesmen did their business—one man, the general manager, was imperiling the structure. The speculations, wild, reckless and unguarded, with less consideration for the eternal fitness of things, than the veriest tyro could exhibit, which ruined the Ontario Bank, covered several years. How they were concealed so that neither directors nor auditors detected them is the conundrum of the hour.

All banks have inspectors who are supposed to possess an unusually keen sense for irregularities, and yet these saw nothing wrong in Mr. McGill's transactions. No one on the management of the concern realized what had happened until the capital of the bank was swept away. The directors are blamed, but how could they detect the gambling? They cannot, at any time, have more than a general idea of the bank's position. They can only know of the details as they are laid before them. Moreover the Ontario's general manager is not the first to speculate, or make "investments" which were calculated to make huge dividends very rapidly. Had Mr. McGill been successful, as some other managers have been, he would have been regarded as a financial genius, though he acted without authority, and his name would have been blazoned all over the land.

There will be a great heart searching among the bankers, and a closer inspection of the investment column. Perhaps there will be a more exacting examination of the securities themselves so that there may be no doubt of their reality and value. The directors will not get the sympathy that is due to the shareholders. It will take some time for them to recover from the shock they have received.

**Ended In A Disagreement.**

The abrupt termination of the premiers' conference, having for its aim a readjustment of the provincial subsidies, is to be regretted. Several of the premiers had special cases for consideration, including Ontario, but only British Columbia made the subsidiary question contingent upon its view of the matter. The Pacific province is peculiarly situated, and it wanted, with regard to the subsidies, a sliding scale which Mr. McBride elaborated.

**THE ONEIDA INDIANS**

In Canada Will Get Slice of \$2,115,000.

Washington, Oct. 16.—The supreme court, yesterday, refused to allow the Seneca, Oneida, Cayuga, and Tuscarora Indians to file a bill to restrain the carrying out of the judgment of the court of claims that 1,400 Oneida Indians, who left New York and settled in Canada some sixty years ago, should participate in the distribution of \$2,115,000 appropriated by congress, last winter, to pay lands ceded to the government in 1851 by the New York Indians. Under the decision the Canadian Indians will receive some \$250,000.

**PTOMAINE POISONING**

On Board British Ship Kills Two.

Queenstown, Oct. 16.—The British steamer, Peruvian, Capt. Mason, from Penarth for Boston, put in here yesterday, and reported having two men dead and four sick on board. The deaths are alleged to be due to ptomaine poisoning, but the vessel will be detained here, pending an investigation by the port authorities.

**Lansdowne Defends Balfour.**

London, Oct. 16.—Lord Lansdowne, addressing 5,000 people at Nottingham convened to settle the controversy concerning Sir Antony Patrick Macdonnell, under secretary to the lord lieutenant of Ireland, and his devotion plan. The speaker declared emphatically that neither ex-Premier Balfour nor his colleagues ever promoted or participated in the promotion of proposals for devolution or anything leading up to home rule.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homestead resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land referred to, such homestead may be acquired by such person residing with the father or mother.  
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.  
Before making application for patent the settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Indian Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.  
**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**  
Coal—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.  
Quartz—A free mine's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$10 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.  
A free mine, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,000 x 1,000 feet.  
The fee for recording a claim is \$5.  
At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$200 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.  
The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 25 per cent on the sale of a placer mine, and 10 per cent on the sale of a lode mine.  
A free mine may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.  
The lease shall have a stroke in operation within one season from the date of the issue for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 25 per cent collected on the output, after it exceeds \$10,000.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.**  
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.  
Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.  
An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.  
In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled, and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.  
An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual, until that application has been disposed of.  
Standing and not liable for cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of father, mother, sister, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.  
Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to priority of entry.  
Particulars of the homestead entry in default, and if subsequently the state is found to be incorrect, will lose the right of re-entry should the tract be vacant, or if entry has been made, it may be summarily cancelled, from the conditions under one of the following plans:  
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each
