Picking Out The Judges.
A while ago some Canadian pessimist suggested that the people should have a voice in the selection of the judges, that they should be nominated and elected as in the United States. The subject is a lively one in view of what is going on in New York state at the present time.
The democratic leaders almost quarrelled over the nominations. Mr. Hearst and Mr. Murray having words about the number of candidates each should select. The circumstance was scandalous in the extreme. No wonder Mr. Hughes, himself a distinguished lawyer, protested.
The idea of a retired saloon-keeper and a social parish sitting down and picking out the men who shall administer justice in the great metropolitan city. Think of the dignity which attaches to the bench when Murphy and Hearst pass upon the occupants and give the stamp of their approval!
The Canadian politician may not like some of the judges, but it cannot be said of any one that he is the tool or implement of his party, and that in accepting appointment he is subject to any power or influence of a political character.

Model For Young Men.

The corporation counsel of New York City, recently appointed by the mayor, W. B. Ellison, is a former Canadian. He left St. Thomas, his old home, when he graduated in law. He located in the foremost American city. He had an ambition, to get in touch with the big men of the day—in business, in industrial activity, in commercial progress and prosperity. He had his wish. He had the good sense, also, to devote his whole time to his profession until he had made a competence for himself. Then, and only then, he went into politics, as a democrat. As a member of the assembly he failed to vote, however, as the party boss directed, and he was turned down. He was not discouraged. Ability and independence will have their recognition, and Mr. McClelland made him a water commissioner, one of three men who had the speaking of millions of dollars. So well did he do his work that when the mayor wanted a head for the city's legal department he put his hand on Ellison. He is thus upon the upward climb, and there is no telling what his future may be. He is not a politician of the ordinary type, but a brave, strong man, with a mind of his own, a capacity for service, and a reputation for integrity. If young men of his day want models here seems to be one well worthy of their study.

Venture Promising Of Success.

A weekly paper, on a new plan, is to be published in Toronto in the beginning of the new year. It is to be the joint production of William H. Moore and J. A. Cooper, graduates of Toronto University.
Mr. Moore has distinguished himself in the railway world as an ally of Mackenzie & Mann, in many of their enterprises. He was especially in evidence of late as the champion of radicals, having large interests in Toronto and its vicinity. Mr. Cooper has made a success of the Canadian Magazine, the financial and literary standing of which is entirely due to his good taste and judgment.
The men who have done so well with all they have undertaken, who do not really know such a word as "fail," can do more confidently launch a new venture without misgiving. True there are several weekly papers in Toronto at the present time. Each has its mission, its attractions, its friends and admirers.
Is there room for another? Surely, if of the kind which fits the age and constituency which it purports to serve. Collier's of New York and the Saturday Evening Post have a wide circulation in Canada, because they are papers of rare excellence and fill a place in literature peculiarly their own. A paper in Canada, similar to either of those, and dealing with Canadian life, business, art, science, literature, politics, must command an ever-widening field of usefulness. The venture has back of it the capital and genius which should make it a complete success.

The plant of Charles McGill, once the general manager of the Ontario Bank, is that he stands alone. It will be fortunate for his colleagues in the directorate if they do not stand with him, when Fay, the big policeman, moves.
The city auditor is one of the luckiest men about the city hall, and he has not his proper reward, as he has suffered. He is not, however, in sympathetic mood.

Bound Hand And Foot.

The attempt to relieve the conservative politicians who speculated in land from exorbitant prices of their intimate relations with the railway magnates will not do.
Mr. Mann did not give them any special guidance when they went to him for pointers as to the route of his road, but he gave them access to the survey, and Mr. Foster admits that later he was sent a map of the railway's route though he does not know who marked it or made him a present of it.
Sir Thomas Shaughnessy would have the people believe, as Mr. Borden has been telling them, that there was nothing in the sale of C. P. R. lands to the Fowler-Pope-Lalury syndicate. No? He had the politicians meet him when the land agent visited Montreal, and though the price had gone up meanwhile to \$5 per acre, he was willing that the 200,000 acres of land should go for \$3.50 per acre. Now the C.P.R. was not sacrificing \$1.50 per acre, or \$300,000, for nothing. The enquiry of the hour is exceedingly pertinent—would this wonderful generosity of the company have been exhibited to a company of land speculators who were not at the same time members of parliament?

Thanks Of The People.

To-morrow is Thanksgiving Day, so named by the government of Canada, and for a specific purpose. That purpose is suggested by the day or the name it is given. Seed time and harvest follow each other with unending regularity. Sometimes the crops are not as good as at other times, but generally they invite gratitude, and it can be best expressed by act of public worship. There is a misconception with regard to the day if some people proceed on the premises that they can express their thanks anywhere, in the home or roadside as well as in the church. The proclamation of the governor-general may not be so worded, but it implies an assembling of the people in public places, there to offer the homage of the heart for the bounties of Providence.
Just what the harvest this year has been cannot be accurately calculated now. The statistics are being collected and presently they will be given out in surprising detail. But enough is known to warrant the conclusion that the crops have never been surpassed, and we can get some idea of their size and value by reflecting on the exhibit of last year. Thus in 1905, the farm products were valued at nearly eighty millions of dollars, while the records of the department of trade and commerce showed the exports to have been worth over two hundred millions and an expansion of nearly double in a little over five years.
And Canada is a young country yet and but entered on its wonderful career of expansion. Population is pouring into the North-West at the rate of over 150,000 a year. The broad acres that have so long lain idle are being occupied and tilled. Since 1893 nearly twelve millions of them have changed hands, and at varying prices that have aggregated over \$40,000,000. The prophecy of the director of the Dominion Experimental farm a year ago, is specially recalled now. It is to the effect that Canada will in time be able to supply with wheat a 30,000,000 home market, and, in addition, the present British requirements three times over.
And this land is ours, with boundless possibilities, with resources that no man can realize, with a government of the people, with peace and prosperity. It is a goodly heritage, and it has been given to a peculiar people, who should be zealous in good works. All around us are the evidences of plenty. Man tilled the soil. He ploughed and sowed, but God sent the sunshine and the rain. The creature simply depended on the promise of the Creator, that while life lasted there would be the changes of the seasons, and so on, laboured in faith and had his reward. He is not thankful? If not he ought to be. All life is sustained by products of the earth. The song of thanksgiving, therefore, should be the song of everyone. Praise, hearty, earnest, universal, in one grand symphony should girdle the globe.
