TOOTH OF A SNAKE

IN A MAN'S BODY FOR TWENTY-YEARS.

Circulated From One Thumb to the Other—Keeper Was Bitten By Boa—Fang Caught in His Hand.

New York, Oct. 19.—Donald Burns, in charge of the bird house in the Central park menagerie, was bitten on the left thumb by a boa constrictor twenty years ago. Yesterday while he was climbing over the iron rail in the bird house with some herbs he felt a sharp pain in his right thumb. A little lump appeared with a point protruding. An incision brought to light a piece of the fang. It had been circulating in Burns' body for twenty years.

In the eighties about the only animal store in the city was kept by Burns in South Street. He also did considerable taxidermy and was widely known among circus men.

One day a box of boa constrictors from South America arrived. Burns opened the box and put his hand in to take them out when he felt a sharp pain, he suddenly drew it out. One of the young boas had bitten Burns' left thumb and the jerk had broken one of the fangs off in the wound.

Since then Burns has gone through many phases of life. He failed in business, went out on the road with a circus, was in a hospital a long time with a broken leg, and some years ago became a lawyer at the Central park menagerie and was placed in charge of the birds.

Several times Burns had experienced a feeling as if he were pricked with needles in different parts of his body. It was the snake's tooth moving along on its journey.

The little piece of ivory gradually worked around from one thumb to the other.

THE LATE KATHANIEL LEONARD.

Napanee Beaver.

Kathaniel Leonard, who died at Napanee on Monday, was born in the county of Grenville, August 1st, 1823, and for over fifty years carried on the business of carriage making at Westbrook. He recently made his home with his daughter, and until a few months ago enjoyed excellent health.

Mr. Leonard was a well read man, and took a keen interest in the affairs of the church and country, and was respected for his integrity and honesty. WILL MAKE THINGS LIVELY.

Wolfe Island, Oct. 18.—Pressed hay has been leaving the island at the rate of one hundred tons per day. To-day a large barge from Montreal, with a capacity of five hundred tons, is being loaded at the island dock.

Duncan Melnes has started to buy hay and it is expected that he will make it lively for the other dealers, as Duncan is well known and has the confidence of the people. He is offering \$8 per ton, an advance of nearly \$1 per ton over the present buyers. If hay continues to leave the island at the present rate, it will be a scarce commodity before spring. Many farmers are hauling out; thirty-two cents is the price being paid. To-day men from the city made the connection between Cape Vincent and the island on the Bell Telephone line. Workmen are erecting the poles to the foot of the island. They have taken up Mr. Connolly's farm at the Cold Spring. The remains of Miss Lillian Healy, who died in Buffalo, were interred here this week. She was formerly of the late Mr. Healy's household. Her sympathy is extended. The death of Mr. Taggart's youngest daughter occurred yesterday; her funeral will take place to-morrow.

Robert Moore, who recently underwent an operation in the Hotel Dix, has so far recovered that he will make a home on the island. Mr. Michael Flood and his brother, Charles Ryan, arrived home on Monday from Philadelphia, where they spent two weeks with relatives. The banners were published last Sunday, of Miss Mary Hawkins and Edward Kelly. The sisters of the town of Province are seeking charity on the island. When the news reached here of the crash in the Ontario Bank it caused quite a flutter of excitement among depositors on the island. The two hotels in the village have been newly painted. William Boyd has moved to the village, and Hiram Davis has moved in his stead. Edward Ouff of Watertown, has disposed of his farm to John McGlynn, a Kingston dealer had a cargo of coal delivered here last week. It was quickly disposed of. Another load will shortly arrive.

LARGEST LOCOMOTIVE

In the World Has Been Sent Out West.

The first of the five largest locomotives in the world, which the Great Northern ordered from the Baldwin works, has been sent west, where it will be put to work on the mountainous terrain of the Mallet compound type, with four cylinders, two sets of drivers and two pairs of cylinders. Each is practically two engines in one, and is capable of hauling over mountain grades twice as much as the best of the Great Northern now has.

The best engine the company has now in service can pull 525 tons up a 2.2 per cent grade, while the new engines will be capable of drawing 1,100 tons on the same grade. The only engine which approaches the Great Northern monsters is owned by the Baltimore & Ohio, which weighs 534,500 pounds.

This new engine will be run on the Great Northern between Leavenworth and Skykomish, Wash. It is intended for freight service and will work on a twenty-five-mile stretch of track, across the cascades. The engine is No. 1890 and has a tractive power of 71,500 pounds. In fact, when in service, the engine is able to pull a heavy train, and that to prevent pulling out of the drawheads on the cars, a second locomotive of the ordinary size will be coupled on just behind to take up the slack.

The locomotive has a weight on the drivers of 316,000 pounds, while the total weight of the engine is 358,000 pounds and the weight of the engine and tender is 593,000 pounds. It has a rating of being able to pull 2,100 tons of freight. The tank on the tender holds 8,000 gallons of water and the tender also carries thirteen tons of coal. The engine has twelve drivers fifty-five inches in diameter.
