MANITOBA ANXIOUS TO HAVE TERRITORIAL AREA EXTENDED

By Adding Keewatin—Area of the Provinces at Present—Ontario is Entitled to Consideration Too.

Ottawa, Oct. 29.—The conference between the dominion authorities and the representatives of Manitoba, Ontario and Saskatchewan on the subject of the re-arrangement of the boundaries of Manitoba will be held on Monday, November 12th. Manitoba is anxious to have her area extended by adding the former district of Keewatin, which is now included in the North-West Territories.

The area of the different provinces at the present time is as follows: Ontario, 260,862 square miles; Quebec, 351,573 square miles. These figures do not include, as far as Ontario is concerned, the portion of the Great Lakes of the St. Lawrence within the territorial limits of Canada, nor as regards Quebec, the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the territorial seas. Nova Scotia has a total area of 21,428 square miles; New Brunswick, 27,955; Manitoba, 73,732; British Columbia, 372,630; Prince Edward Island, 2,184; Saskatchewan, 269,650; Alberta, 265,540.

The present North-West Territories have an area of 1,922,735 square miles, and the Yukon Territory, 297,076. The total area of the dominion amounts to 3,714,695 square miles, of which 123,756 are water and the remainder land.

Of all the provinces, except the three maritime provinces, Manitoba has the smallest area. The old district of Keewatin had an area of 470,516 square miles, and Ungava, which lies to the north of Quebec, an area of 354,801. If Ungava were added to Quebec it would give that province the largest territorial area of any province in the dominion, the total being 706,531 square miles. If the whole of the old district of Keewatin were allotted to Manitoba the present province would be the second in size in Canada, its total being 541,148 square miles.

Ontario, however, in any re-arrangement that might be made, is entitled to consideration. A portion of Keewatin is wedged in between Ontario and Manitoba, and it seems but reasonable to expect that the dominion government will make provision for Ontario receiving additional territory in any change of provincial boundaries that may take place.

MARKET PRICES.

The Winter Apple Crop is Reported Small.

The heavy rain of Friday and the foggy winds of Saturday at Saturday's market, the prices were about the same as on Saturday last, with the exception of apples which have soared to all prices. Butter was freely purchased at from 27c. to 30c. a pound. Fresh eggs found a ready sale at from 25c. to 26c. a dozen. An abundance of market truck sold for 5c. to 10c. Spring chickens brought 45c. to 50c. per pair; ducks from 75c. to \$1.35 a pair; potatoes, 90c. to \$1 a bag; apples from 10c. to 25c. a peck. It is reported by farmers that the crop of winter apples will be very active this year as the heavy rains blew them from the trees.

Abusive Language.

A case of abusive language was yesterday publicly reported. It had its beginning in the Sunday drinking freshly permitted in Kingston for nearly two years, which the authorities here and in Toronto seemed to be intensely satisfied with. Two young men started out early in the morning and became very drunk before mid-day. Their relatives complained to the license inspector of the tavern-keeper to whom word was speedily passed by some of the neighbors. The tavern keeper reproached the young men, and they in turn abused their aunt in vilest language, so bad that if relationship did not shield them they would be summoned and heavily fined.

Will Serve as Stimulus.

Principal Gordon of Queen's, states that Hon. John Charlton, according to promise made two years ago, has raised the endowment fund of \$20,000 for the endowment of the chair of moral philosophy. The money is given in the name of himself and his deceased wife, Ella G. Charlton. The promise of Mr. Charlton to endow a chair at Queen's was the beginning of the present efforts towards the endowment fund of half a million dollars, and its fulfillment is most gratifying to the friends of Queen's. It will certainly serve as a stimulus to others to come forward and contribute.
