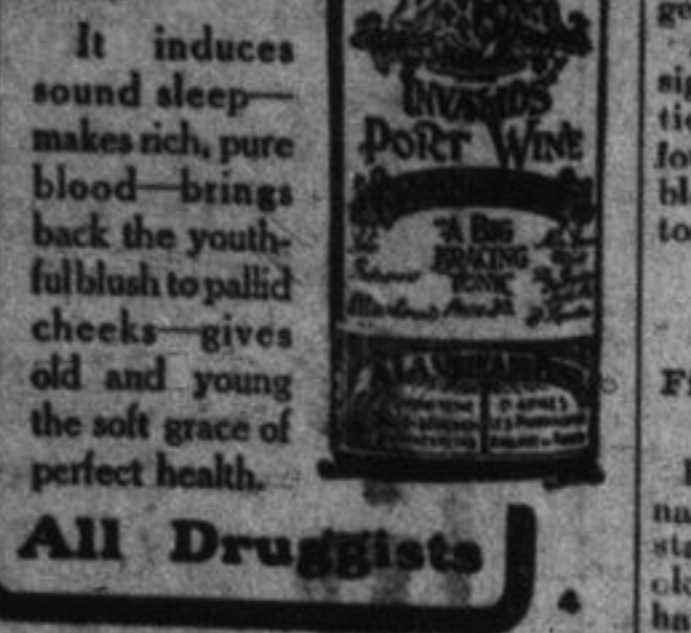

ATE OSTRICH FOOD PRISONER DIES AS RESULT OF INDIGESTIBLE FOOD.

China, Brass and Flannel—Told His Wife That When People Were Ill in Prison Release Was Easily Obtained.
 London, Oct. 27.—Seldom was such an extraordinary story told to a coroner as that which C. L. Drew listened to at Wormwood Scrubs prison, where he held an inquest on the body of Harold Williams, a builder and shopkeeper, of Granville Gardens, Shepherd's Bush, who died in prison.
 Williams was a veritable human ostrich. While in prison he swallowed quantities of flannel and cotton wool torn from his chest protector, china broken from a prison soap dish, and a brass ring which he had smuggled into the jail. In addition, he had

DISASTER TO TUNNEL.

Enormous Pressure From Above is Now Observed.
 Geneva, Oct. 27.—The roof of the second tunnel, through the Simplon, has commenced to sink, not being sufficiently strong to resist the tremendous perpendicular pressure of the mountain above, over 1,000 feet in height.
 The official report says: "Lately the roof of the second tunnel, owing to the great pressure, has partly fallen in, necessitating the immediate undertaking of the work of repairing the vault of the tunnel."
 The principal tunnel is also endangered by the proximity of the falling roof, which is likely to upset the equilibrium of both bores. If a landslide should occur in the second tunnel the side of the chief tunnel would cave in.
 It will be remembered that Lausanne engineer, who is in no way connected with the Simplon enterprise, in giving an independent report at the time when the great heat and the discovery of boiling springs in the heart of the chief tunnel stopped work, said that it was his opinion that only steel rafters, twenty inches thick, would be able to withstand the heat and support the enormous pressure in the middle of the vaults. The steel rafters employed, if I am not mistaken, are fifteen inches thick.
 The boiling springs still exist, and the heat in the tunnel is still unbearable.

BOY COMMITS CRIME.

Fifteen-Year-Old Lad Stabs Mother With Knife.
 Paris, Oct. 27.—A washer woman, named Mme. Carvet, has been nearly stabbed to death by her fifteen-year-old son, Gaston, who is believed to have committed the deed in the evening. Mme. Carvet was awakened in her room by a terrible blow on her shoulder. On starting up she saw her son brandishing over her with a knife in his hand. She called for help, but the youth repeatedly stabbed her, and then walked quietly back to his room and went to bed.
 Mme. Carvet staggered out of her apartments for assistance, and was taken to the St. Louis hospital, where she lies in a critical condition.
 The boy, when taxed with the crime, denied that he had done it or knew anything about it.

GIGANTIC FRAUDS.

Thefts Involving Many Millions Discovered in Camp.
 Paris, Oct. 27.—Extensive thefts of army stores, said to be valued at many millions of francs, have been discovered at the great military camp at Chalons-sur-Marne.
 The thefts are believed to have continued steadily for a number of years, in spite of careful monthly inspections by responsible officers.
 The thefts were revealed through the chance discovery at a baker's shop at Chalons-sur-Marne of a number of sacks of flour bearing the military stamp.
 When the baker was arrested he confessed to having purchased the flour from a man named Descaud, living near the barracks. Descaud, in turn, revealed the names of sergeants who, he asserted, supplied him with the goods. Two of them are now in the military prison, and other non-commissioned officers are to be arrested.
 The military authorities found large quantities of bacon, sugar, rice, beans, coffee and flour, all bearing the official stamp, on sale in other local shops.
 The supplies were stored by the military authorities in a disused convent, and removed at night to Descaud's shop.
