In the opinion of a Toronto official referee who has handled games in the east, the Tigers' wing line is not as strong as either Montreal or Ottawa, but their back division is much superior.

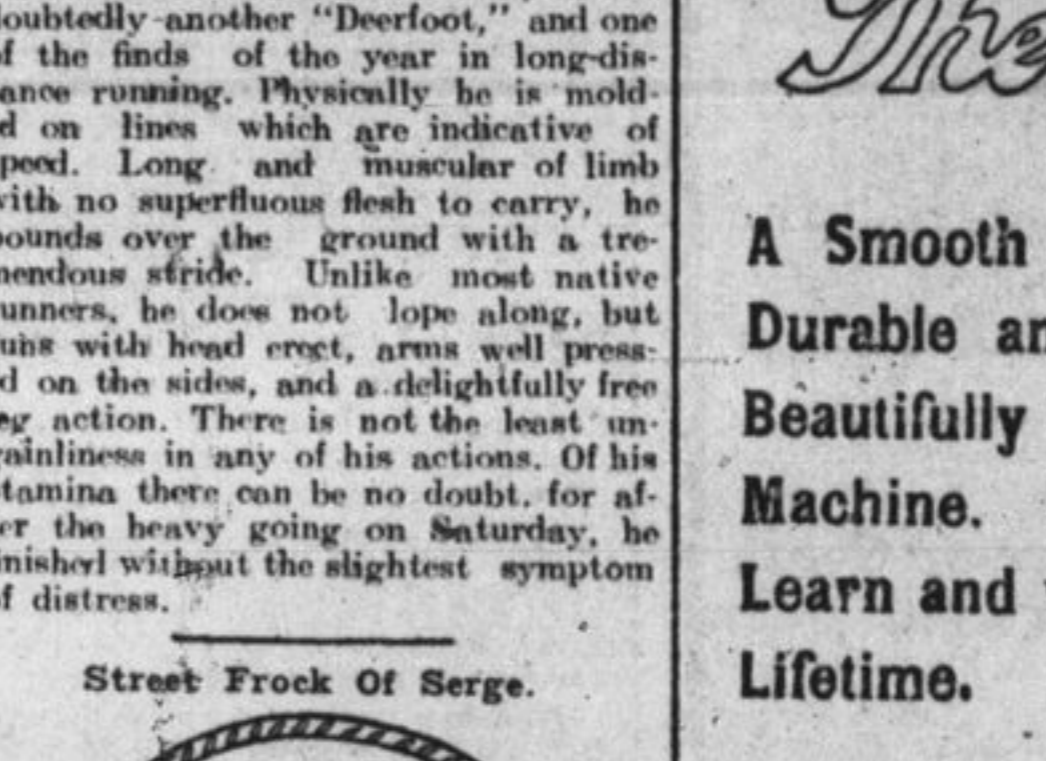
