STIOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. Any numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, either in whole or in part, may be homesteaded by any person the title hereof is not less than 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homesteaded entry of lands must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local agent or Sub-agent. The application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the Minister of the Interior, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is situated on a river or lake, such application is to have priority and the land will be sold until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by the Minister.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant liable to prosecution. An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homesteaded entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particular the homesteaded entry is desired, and if subsequently the statement is found false, the applicant will lose any entry rights of priority should the land become vacant, if it is not so cancelled. A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans:-

- (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years and (2) If the father or mother, if the latter is deceased, of a homesteaded residence upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homesteaded residence, the requirements may be satisfied by residence upon such land. Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal-Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or partnership. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be deducted on the gross output.

CONFERENCE ENDED

LAST TWO LECTURES BY PROF. JORDAN.

"Babylon and the Bible"—"Assyriology and the Old Testament"—Evidence Should Not Be Twisted For Contrary.

The fifteenth alumni conference of Queen's University concluded this morning. The last two lectures given by Rev. Prof. Jordan, in connection with his series entitled, "The Old Testament as a Problem." "Babylon and the Bible" was the subject of Prof. Jordan's lecture, Thursday evening. The lecturer began by stating that in the light of the new knowledge now available we must consider the old contrast between Babylon and Zion. This is now a complex question that needs to be faced with calm impartiality. No one can claim any sense be called a student would ever dream of thinking that all goodness and perfection was embodied in Israel, and that Babylon was the incarnation of all the vices. The contrast between the two has never gone to that length and certainly to enlightened prophets such a view was impossible. But on the other hand it is equally true that light from sources ancient and modern is thrown upon the subject, to maintain that there is historical justification for linking the ideal of the name of Zion, while Babylon stands in the main for worldly science and commercial success. The more we study the history of these two nations, the more clearly do we see that there may be close contact between two peoples without slavish dependence of matters of thought and life, in fact they may be great similarity in external form and great diversity in spiritual content. Out of very similar surroundings, according to the genius and inspiration, with which different peoples endowed, may arise different forms of faith and conduct. According to Prof. Delitzsch, the most enthusiastic representative of Babylon, the state religion of that country remained for three thousand years gross polytheism. Even a superficial sketch of the history of Israel shows the nation is independent of its people, and the religious originality of its prophets. We gladly welcome all reliable information concerning ancient Babylon. But while this illustrates many things in the life of the Hebrew people, it does not tend to lessen our sense of the great contribution which the more clearly do we see that there may be close contact between two peoples without slavish dependence of matters of thought and life, in fact they may be great similarity in external form and great diversity in spiritual content.

BRITISH HOUSE OF LORDS.

Crisis in Parliamentary Government. Review of Reviews.

The opening of the autumn session of the British parliament brings the House of Lords question to the front. As it is likely to remain there for some time it may not be unprofitable to indicate the salient outlines of the "great controversy" between the peers and the people.

The House of Lords is the only legislative chamber in the whole of the territories where English is spoken which is based solely upon the hereditary principle. Leaving on one side new creations, the lords of appeal and the bishops, no man sits in the upper house excepting for the reason that he is the son of his father, although in the case of the Irish and Scottish contingent he must add to that original qualification the fact of his election by the peers of Ireland and Scotland to sit as their representative in the imperial parliament. As at present constituted the House of Lords contains 253 members, against 670 members of the House of Commons, all of whom are elected by the householders of the three kingdoms. Of the 253 persons who have a right to sit in the House of Lords, twenty-six are bishops, who sit by virtue of their position as representatives of the immemorial members of the established church. Forty-four are representative Irish (26) and Scottish (18) peers, elected by their fellow-peers, four are lords of appeal created for life, chiefly for the purpose of enabling the house to exercise its judicial functions as supreme court of appeal, and 119 are peers in their own right. As might be expected from its constitution, the House of Lords is

permanently conservative. The majority of the House of Commons, today, is liberal, yesterday it was conservative, to-morrow it may be unionist or radical. But the House of Lords is always held by a solid stalwart majority of conservatives. The liberal minority may number ten per cent of the whole house, but not more than that. It is the permanence of this overwhelming tory majority in the upper house which has at last brought about the political crisis in Great Britain. For at the last general election, the constituencies by majority without precedent elected a House of Commons in which the conservatives were only 158, as against 512 of the combined forces of their political opponents. The moment the result of the polls was declared a conflict between the two houses was seen to be inevitable. The assent of both houses is necessary before any bill can be passed into law. In legislation, especially in matters which relate to the taxation of the people, the rights of the two houses are the same. The House of Commons alone can originate financial legislation. The House of Lords may reject financial measures en bloc, it must not amend them. As a rule this right to reject taxing bills is never exercised. And it is the exclusive possession of the power of the purse that enables the House of Commons to hold its own in the government of the empire.
