Was the Meeting at Portmouthe, Eng.

London, Nov. 7.—The official account of the meeting at Portmouthe barracks, on Sunday and Monday, makes the matter to be much less serious than popular report made it. The insubordination, it is declared, consisted mainly of a noisy demonstration by discontented strikers. No personal injuries of a serious nature were received by anybody. It was reported 120 of the mutineers were arrested, but only the ring leaders were detained.

**Death of Capt. Patterson.**

Word was received in the city this morning of the death, at St. Paul, Minn., of Capt. Francis Patterson. He had barely reached home after a visit to his daughter, Mrs. James Patterson, in this city, when heart trouble, from which he had suffered, overcame him. He was born in Scotland, seventy-eight years ago, and for many years was identified with local interests in Kingston. He then moved to Winnipeg, and from there to St. Paul, where he lived for six years. His widow, who was Mrs. Falconer, sister of Mrs. Archibald Strachan, survives him, together with one daughter and four sons. Two of the latter are in St. Paul and two in the far west. When in Kingston, he was an attendant of St. Andrew's church. The body will be brought here for burial. Capt. Patterson was a man most highly esteemed, and his death will be very widely regretted. It is a great consolation to friends here to know that so recently they were privileged to have him amongst them.
