SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting areas not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person, male or female, who is at least over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 100 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local agent or Sub-agent. An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be filed with the local agent, and upon receipt of the application and the fee thereon, the Sub-agent will issue a receipt for the application and it will have priority and the land will be held subject to the conditions under one of the following regulations: (1) At least six months' residence upon an acreage of the land in each year during the term of the homestead. (2) If the father or mother, if the settler is a minor, is a resident upon a farm in the vicinity of the homestead, the settler may be satisfied by residence upon such land. (3) Before making application for patent the settler must file a statement in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so. (4) Coal—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for hard coal. (5) If the settler has discovered mineral places, may locate a claim \$500. (6) The fee for recording a claim is \$1.50. (7) At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the minister in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the settler may upon having a survey made, and upon compliance with the regulations, purchase the land at \$1 per acre. (8) A royalty of 25 per cent for the payment of a royalty of 25 per cent on the sale of the property mining claims generally are 100 feet wide. (9) A settler may obtain two tracts of land for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of Interior. The lease shall have a drive in operation within one year of the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river land. SERVIA'S LABORERS. They Are at Heart Simple and Honest. Servia's laborer is at heart a simple, prosaic fellow. His attire is coarse almost to the point of uncleanliness—rough brown trousers of homespun, a coat a shade or two darker and edged with a strip of black fleece; a peaked woolen cap and a cane, and you have the picture. He is a farmer on a small scale, and his hobby is raising hogs, which he turns into the forests or fields to fatten on mast. The rural life in Servia is primitive. At sunup folk rise, take their rabi, or schnapps, and go to the fields to work. Their meal is brought to them at noon and again in the evening; for they often work until sunset. And so life goes on. Across the bluffs that border the river a road runs parallel with the Danube, and here workmen are seen dressed often in white suits with red girdles, striving to bring from the earth the grain that will not come in Roumania and Bulgaria; the grain lands are rich, but here the earth seems stubborn and unproductive. So the laborer ekes out his existence as he may—the least interesting of all the laborers of southern Europe.
