

WHEALING IN SHETLAND.

Every Part of the Creature Made Use Of. A visitor who has spent the last two summers in Shetland describes the industry carried on in that British island. He writes: Every part of the whale is made use of. The blubber is run down into oil. The fish-bone, dried and ground into cattle food; the bones and offal are boiled, dried, and ground into guano. Only the liquid that escapes during the cutting up, and a little overflow from the pipes, runs into the sea. The sheep and cattle feed close down to the stations, even among the blades of whalpoes spread out on the grass to dry. I understand the workmen regularly cook and eat the whale fish. In Denmark it has been the custom for years. This year one of the Shetland whalers killed several hundred barrels. Regarding the kind of whale killed, there are two. The larger, 40 to 50 feet long, yield about 20 barrels of oil, and is found 20 to 120 miles at sea; the smaller whale, 25 to 45 feet long, about 15 barrels, 10 to 20 miles at sea. The herring boat, which is found much closer inshore, is not taken. It only yields about one barrel of oil, and does not pay to kill.

The Pocket Issue. The principal of a high school of Denver has ordered that all pupils have pockets in their dresses. Every day purses are found on the floor, showing that girls have no place to keep them. In nearly every school he says, one or more pupils would be strongly tempted to take these purses, and would yield to the temptation themselves, if the small purses were not put in a pocket.
