### Wait For The Army.

General Carter, of the United States army, writes upon the profession to which he belongs, and the unpopularity of which among the classes is very apparent. The army is not sought by young men of America, and the general has a theory of his own for the cure of this condition. It is that the nation should require those who have become wealthy under the flag, to give their sons to the army.

The way would be to make the pay of the average officer so low that no one without means other than his pay could afford to hold a commission. The experience of England and Germany would be repeated, and in time of war the fighting forces of those empires have been sadly handicapped. During and after the South African war, when so many officers, the scions of nobility, failed, it was given out that the army would be opened to the flower of the kingdom, and that promotion and command would depend upon skill, experience, and ability.

The nation to the south is not making enough of its army, or rather of its officers. They are not the social lions that General Carter thinks they should be. But the officers of the United States Army are not designed to create sensations in society. They are schooled and disciplined for a purpose, and that purpose is outside of the social circle altogether.

### Victim Of Political Venom.

Judge Colter, of St. Thomas, is being variously considered in view of his vindication of W. H. Hepburn, who was accidentally dragged into a scandal about the Butler hotel, in East Elgin. Hepburn stopped one night, while a candidate in the by-election, at the hotel, and because he would not, as alleged, submit to blackmail, and put up a generous sum, his name was coupled with a charge of disorderly and immoral conduct.

The hotel-keeper appealed from the conviction of the magistrate, and in confirming this judgment the county judge referred to the manner in which Mr. Hepburn had been slandered. "Both the prosecution and the defence," said he, "joined all their efforts to prove him guilty. There was the utmost confidence and agreement between them. It was a low feat. Hepburn was there with his hands tied. He could not summon a witness, or ask a question. The alleged offence had been committed on August 12th. The prosecution was delayed so as to bring on the trial just on the eve of the election. The judge held that the whole procedure was arranged with the sole object of injuring an innocent man, with a political motive."

It is unfortunate, says a contemporary, that Mr. Hepburn did not stand his ground and fight his accusers. What could he do for the time being? He resigned as a political candidate and later, mortified beyond expression by the attacks of the enemy, he sold his property and moved away. He can live down the memory of the scandal, but what the men who occasioned it, and who knew they were injuring an innocent one, will or can do to atone for their offences remains to be seen. That they would deliberately plot to ruin a man, to rob him of his character, his priceless possession, is almost beyond belief.

Brookville got a price from the government's commission for electric power, but if Kingston, Gananoque and Prescott join in the rate may be lower. Here is something for the board of trade to do. It should get busy.

### Clean Sweep Of Offices.

The success of the democrats, in so far as the main state offices in New York are concerned is a cause for great rejoicing. The republicans have the governor, and a majority in the legislature, and they may have a very restraining effect on the men who hold the patronage. The superintendent of public works is a republican, and he will, outside of the engineering force, control all the appointments to public offices, and award all the contracts for the large canal work. But democrats have the spending of money for city millions of dollars.

The new democratic state officers will wield great power through control of the state canal board, which approves all plans for the large canal, the state land board, which issues grants of land under water and generally supervises state lands; the canal fund commission, and the state board of equalization. They will still further control the state board of canvassers, which will be called upon in 1908 to canvass the vote in this state for presidential electors. All these boards and commissions are made up of state elective officers.

Here is an estimate of the amount of money the democratic state officers will be allowed to spend on their department each year: state engineer and surveyor, exclusive of large canal construction, \$45,000; secretary of state, \$82,000; attorney-general, \$137,000; state comptroller, \$233,000; state treasurer, \$29,000.

Governor Hughes will have a large batch of appointments to make during his term, including a commissioner of agriculture at \$1,000 a year, a state architect at \$7,500, a superintendent of banks at \$7,000, three charities commissioners, three canal appraisers at \$5,000 each, a superintendent of public works at \$6,000, a fiscal supervisor at \$3,000, two state tax commissioners at \$5,000 three commissioners of quarantine and three railroad commissioners at \$8,000 each, three civil service commissioners, port wardens, health officer of the Port of New York, and a superintendent of elections.

The greatest change in offices occurs at and around Albany, the state capital. There are in the city over three hundred persons on the pay roll, and have to make way for democrats, while in addition to the capitol patronage there are hundreds of jobs which the republicans have enjoyed and which will now be dispensed by the democratic state officers. This is the translation objected to. The republicans have been in office too long, and have been very corrupt. The new governor has promised to regenerate the administration, and he can best do this by making a clean sweep of the departments and of all and sundry who have in any way betrayed their trusts.

C. E. Smith, of the Hydro-Electric commission, says electricity cannot be sold cheaply when generated by steam power. Is there any chance of Kingston being served otherwise?

The republican candidate in any district in Ohio which was visited by the president's son-in-law was defeated. Hence the question, Is the gentleman a hoodoo?

Henry Watson, of Louisville, the veteran democrat, rejoices in the defeat of Hearst. His success meant the downfall of the democracy. The cause he damaged survives, but it must be purged and cleaned.

Two men have suffered by the New York election - C. F. Murphy and W. R. Hearst. One is being dropped by Tammany and the other by the Independence League. There is no glory in an unholy alliance.

Commissioner Kent's appreciation of the company's conduct was one well deserved. In closing he said: "The directors have done their duty nobly; there is no complaint to be made against them, nor any one of them."

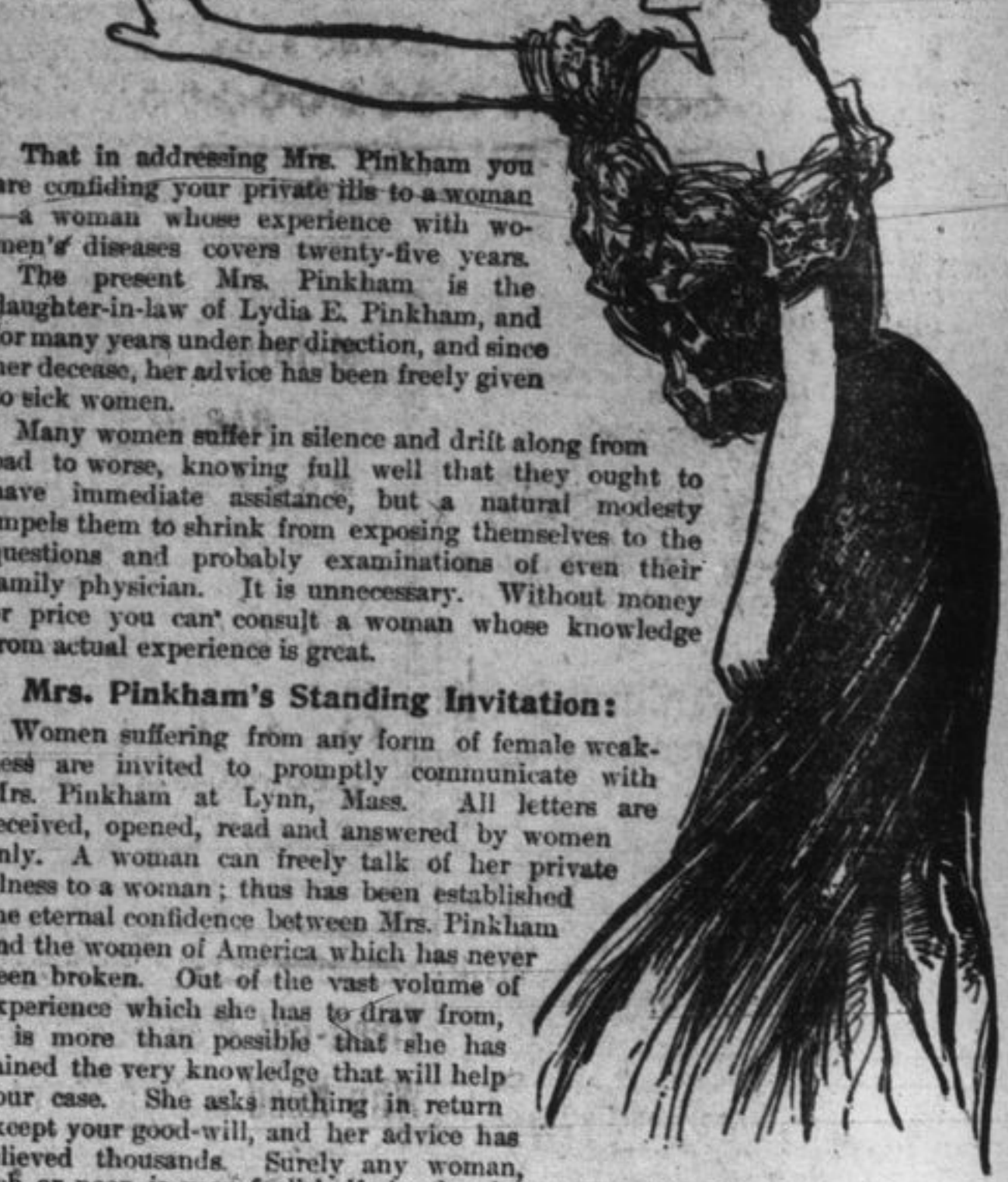
