**BOARD OF WORKS**  
HAD THE SUBWAY MATTER BEFORE THEM.

Civic Finance Committee to Deal With Paying G.T.R. Co's Claim—City Solicitor Reports Upon the Dedication of Streets.  
The board of works met last evening in attendance were Aldermen Macdonell, Gaskin, Cooper, Gaskin, Baseman and Craig.  
City Solicitor McIntyre reported that Mrs. Margaret Brophy had no claim upon the city for remuneration for land used in opening up Stephen street. He stated that Mrs. Brophy had divided her land into building lots and sold some of them. Houses were built, and eventually land for a street was dedicated to the city by Mrs. Brophy filing a plan of lots. The city accepted the land, and was in no wise liable for any payment.  
Upon the application of L. J. Day for permission to lay out a street forty feet wide through his property, from Hill street to Johnson street (west of Macdonell street), the city solicitor got information as to the law. Unless a three-quarter vote of council is secured, nothing less than a sixty-foot street can be accepted by the city. The opinion of the committee was that there could be demanded enough for building lots in that vicinity for the city to accept forty-foot street. It was decided to leave the matter over to the Board of Works, and advise the parties interested to try and come to some arrangement whereby each of them (L. J. Day and J. R. Carruthers), would give enough land to make the street sixty-six feet. Mr. Carruthers has so far refused to give any of his land for the proposed street, claiming that it would not benefit him.  
The city engineer was instructed to report upon the simplest way of giving relief to the people of Vine street, near Ellice street, who complain of a bad sewer. The engineer was also instructed to report upon a petition for a drain on Cherry street near Flumb street.  
The solicitor and the engineer were instructed to report upon the claim of Mrs. Kenally for damages for injuries sustained by falling on a bad walk on the north side of William street, between Bagot and Wellington streets.  
The city's liability in connection with the subway to be built at the G. T. R. junction, received the consideration of the committee. The city solicitor advised payment of the G. T. R. company's bill of \$485 as the city's share of the land purchased. He said he could not advise the city to pay the bill. Besides being responsible for half the cost of the land purchased, the city has to pay for half of the excavation and half of the cost of drainage. The committee part of the matter, the finance committee will deal with that. What it was asked to do was to approve of the plans for the connection of the subway. There was no disposition on the part of the committee to either approve or disapprove of the plans for something that was outside of the city limits, and into which the city has been drawn in such a ridiculous way by the railway committee of the privy council. Accordingly no action was taken for the present.  
E. J. McClelland, assistant engineer, applied for increase of salary, from \$750 to \$1,000. The members of the committee were of the opinion that the city could not afford to pay any more for engineer's clerk. Ald. Craig said that Mr. McClelland had extra labor last summer in view of there being no city engineer. He moved that that be given a bonus of fifty dollars, for that work. Ald. Gaskin moved that no action be taken. The vote was a tie and accordingly no action was taken on the communication.  
Ald. Gaskin and Carson intimated that they were opposed to raising the salaries of civic servants, just now anyway. Ald. Craig and Ald. Baseman held that Mr. McClelland was at least entitled to a bonus for a large amount of work he did in the summer, when the city had no engineer.
