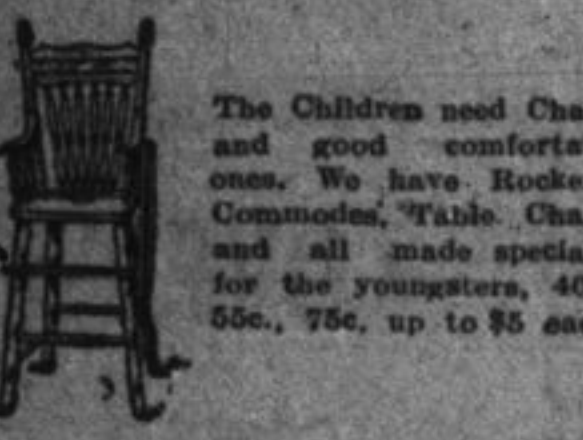

THE VICTORY OF QUEEN'S

Defeated the Varsity Team in Toronto on Saturday Afternoon.

The Score Was Eleven to Nine—Queen's Led at Half Time—Queen's Have Proved to Be the Best of the College Teams.

Queen's senior rugby team has caused great consternation in Toronto. On Saturday afternoon on the Toronto University athletic field, it finished its season's schedule by administering a defeat to Varsity, the team that has been preparing to meet Hamilton Tigers for the Dominion rugby championship.

The whistle blew for half-time with the ball in Varsity's possession only a few yards out, and in the second period time was up with the leather held by the local collegians so close to Queen's line that the spectators went wild, believing a try had been scored.

The Montreal Standard says: "The scheduled series of matches in the Intercollegiate Rugby League is over, but who are champions? If the judgment of the Intercollegiate athletic board is followed, without any qualification, then Queen's, with probably the weakest team in the league, are champions, or at least stand first, and will probably not lose their place as the result of the game which McGill played with Varsity on Saturday."

The Limestones Defeated. The Limestones were defeated in Port Hope on Saturday. Score, Toronto Tammany Tigers, 13; Limestones, 1. Though the local team will not contend for the better team won, the form shown by the Tigers was superior to Limestones, who had not had a hard practice for two weeks.

The officials were kept busy watching the game. Both teams required attention and penalties were frequent. The ball was kept in the scrimmage too much to suit the spectators, but before the whistle blew for half time Southern returned himself for the error made at the start of the game by kicking a drop from the field.

The second half was considerably looser and the playing fast. Queen's back division played the game of their lives, especially "Buck" Crawford, Queen's full-back, who repeated by saved the day by headwork and fast dashes from behind his line. Four touches-in-goal were scored by Varsity at intervals during the second half, putting them ahead by 9 to 6. Five minutes before time was called, Hale received the ball from Gibbon and Fraser, ran forty-five yards for a touch, which was not converted. Score, Queen's, 11; Varsity, 9.

MOVED THE VESSEL

The Steamer Bavarian Will Be Taken Off.

On Friday afternoon last the engineers at work on the stranded steamer Bavarian on Wye Rock, succeeded in raising the ship off the shell of rock on which she was stranded, and in moving her a distance of ninety feet; they had, indeed, practically effected a floating, but owing to an insufficiency of lowboats at the time, the work was temporarily abandoned.

The schooner Acadia arrived from Oswego with coal for Crawford. The schooner Mary Ann Lydon, from Oswego, is unloading coal at Anglin's. At Richardson's Schooner Ariadne, from Wolfe Island, with grain, barge D. L. left for Quebec with 40,000 bushels of oats, towed by tug Weatherly.

SERMON BY PROF. J. CLARK MURRAY

Epworth League Services. Yesterday was Epworth League anniversary Sunday in Sydenham Street Methodist church and Rev. E. E. Hartford, Montreal, preached at both services. The morning discourse was to the text, "Whoever chooses his text from John viii, 32. He opened his address by quoting the answer he received from many men when he asked to become a Christian; the answer generally was the same, that to be a Christian put restrictions on man that were not agreeable. The preacher argued that this was a wrong view and pointed out that any person who deserves a thorough education along any line whether science, art or music had to restrict himself in a certain extent to study.

Another Memorial. Yesterday a temporary altar had to be provided for the 'centennial' services at St. George's cathedral, the sanctuary being in the hands of the layers, Campbell & Co., of Toronto. A beautiful brass altar rail has been added to the list of improvements as a memorial to the late Archdeacon Bedford-Jones.
