HIS BIG FIND

A Revolution Likely Made In Electricity.

A POOR QUEBECKER

HAS MADE A REMARKABLE DISCOVERY.

Current Generated Directly From the Earth—Sells Rights For Million and a Half—Plan of His Discovery. Quebec, Nov. 20.—It is claimed that a poor young French-Canadian here has made a wonderful discovery in the generation of electricity which will reduce the cost of house lighting and heating to a mere trifle and seriously threaten investments everywhere in coal gas and electric companies should it come into general application, and that all the patent rights have been purchased by a powerful American coal-mining syndicate to keep them out of the market. The amount paid is said to be \$1,500,000, of which \$250,000 is in cash. The fortunate discoverer of this new principle is a young fellow named Ledere, aged twenty-two, who was born and resides in this city with his parents. He is entirely uneducated, and is a plumber by trade. It appears that while engaged as an apprentice in learning his trade, he developed special interest and remarkable aptitude in electrical work and devoted all his spare time and money to acquiring information on the subject, though he could neither read nor write, concerning the idea that sufficient electric current might be generated directly from the earth instead of by costly water and steam power plants located at a distance from the points of consumption. He worked along the lines of this theory, first merely bells, in which he was successful, and then to light and heat houses, in which, it is claimed, he also fully succeeded some time ago. Since then the secret has been carefully kept until all the patent rights were secured in America and Europe. With the aid of a machine of his invention, which is said to may be placed in an ornamental box case, taking up very little space, a sufficient electric current can be generated to light and heat a building from the ground directly underneath at an annual cost so small as to seem almost ridiculous. Every household in which this manufacture his own electricity for his lighting and heating purposes. The equipment required for the discovery is said to be vouched for by experts.

CONVICT MAIL ROBBER.

Is Sued by a United States Senator. Philadelphia, Pa., May 20.—George Mitchell, alias Alfred Henry, now a prisoner in Carson City penitentiary, undergoing sentence for mail robbery, has been made the defendant in a civil action brought in the Montgomery county court to recover a lot at Glenville, which it is alleged, he purchased by forging a draft found amongst the contents of a stolen mail pouch. George B. Nixon, United States senator of Nevada, and John S. Cain, ex-Governor of Nevada, and George Wingfield of Goldfield, Neb. are the plaintiffs in this unique suit which will proceed to-morrow or the day after at Nevada bank court.

The Canadian Associated Press understands Princess Victoria admired the study, and wished to have it completed, but the queen has purchased it. Mr. Forbes has been commanded to send it to Sandringham, so that the King and Queen of Norway may see it.

HEART WILL RUN NO MORE.

San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 20.—William H. Hearst passed through San Antonio on his way to Monterey, Mex. where he holds property. In reference to politics in New York, he said: "I will never again be a candidate. I shall continue to live in New York and continue to support the principles of reform which I always have stood for, but these principles are now sufficiently understood by the general public for it to be no longer necessary for me to be a candidate, and on that account to be attacked with such bitterness."

THE POLICE READY

AND TOOK THE SCREAMING LADIES IN TOW. They Gathered to Take the House of Commons By Storm, and Were Ignominiously Led Captive By London's Guardians. London, Nov. 20.—A considerable number of suffragettes, headed by Mrs. Deane, were in attendance when the House of Commons met, yesterday afternoon, with the intention of carrying the house by storm, but the police recognized them, and refused to allow them to enter the parliament building.

THE FINISH

Of The Suffragettes Tactics Was Arrest. The women tried to force an entrance, but were compelled to abandon the effort, owing to the overwhelming police of men, who declined to move away, however, and scattered about Old Palace Yard in groups. Several attempted to make speeches, but when the police interfered the women became violent. A continually swelling crowd added to the excitement. Finally several of the suffragettes, including Mrs. Deane, were arrested.

ORSON NICHOLSON. Washington, D.C., Nov. 20.—Orson Nicholson, eighty-two years old, is a veteran of the Mexican war and served under General Lee when Ulysses Grant was lieutenant. Subsequently in the civil war Nicholson was arrayed in the ranks of the union under Gen. Grant against his former commander.

BAVARIAN AT QUEBEC

And She Will Lie There All Winter. Quebec, Nov. 20.—The Bavarian, safely beached in the mud, at Indian Cove, to the eastward of Gilmour's wharf, last evening, will pass the winter there. This is the decision which has been taken this morning. She is drawing thirty-three feet of water, and only ten feet forward. A GRAVE CHARGE.

Convict Promised Liberty if He Would Swear Falsely. Portage la Prairie, Nov. 20.—Hale, one of the Birnie gang, whose members figured largely in the docket of the recent assizes here, and who was sent down for three years for arson, has made a statement, declaring that he committed perjury in testifying against his pal, S. Buchanan, who received a seven-year sentence for the same offence. Hale says he gave false evidence at the suggestion of the crown detective, who promised him he should be free, provided Buchanan was convicted, and also promised to secure him a job with the license department as a spotter at fifty dollars a month. This confession has been forwarded to the attorney-general's department.

JUDGE WOODS DEAD.

Passed Away at Chatham on Tuesday. Chatham, Ont., Nov. 20.—After an illness extending over a period of several weeks, Robert Stuart Woods, K. C., died here, to-day, aged eighty-seven years. Up to the time of his death he was revising officer of the electoral district of Kent county, previous to which office he was justice of the peace, local judge of the high court of justice, surrogate judge in the western district.

TWO SCHOONERS MISSING.

Quebec, Nov. 20.—The schooner Florida (Capt. Ouellette) and Josephine (Capt. McDonald), which left here some days ago for St. Anne des Monts, with a general cargo, have not been heard of since and fears are entertained for their safety. The Josephine was loaded with supplies for St. T. Lamontagne. The schooner St. Cerice (Capt. Deslauriers), is ashore at River du Loup, but will be got off as she is not much damaged.

A HOT CAMPAIGN

WILL BE OTTAWA'S MUNICIPAL CONTEST. City Auditor Resigns, Assessment Commissioner Dismissed, and Plenty More Trouble Brewing—Gilmour Hotel the Casus Belli.
