# THE BOARD OF TRADE To Tender Testimonial To William Lesslie In Recognition of His Great Marine Accomplishment--Kingston's Important Need at Present Is To Get Cheaper Power.

The board of trade held its weekly meeting in the rooms last evening. President W. T. Minns occupied the chair. About thirty members were present. A reply was received from the Canadian Express company, stating that the rate of one dollar a hundred pounds from Toronto to Kingston and from Kingston to Montreal was the mileage rate that had been in force for years. The rate of one dollar for freight from Toronto to Montreal, existed on account of the large amount of business handled out of these places. The board will look further into the matter when more information is received. James A. Minnes advocated a closer connection with the city council's industries' committee with reference to having definite knowledge as to what the city had to offer industries wishing a place of settlement. To approach industrial companies, the city must be in a position at all times to make definite offers as to site, taxation etc. Mayor Mowat said he was sure that the city industries' committee would be ready at all times to co-operate with the board of trade in the matter of approaching industries. There could be mutual arrangement on that point. John Hewton said that the board should take up the question of power supply at once. Kingston lacked power, and, therefore, had little to offer industries in the way of inducements. F. R. Anglin stated that some places were actually offering free power and hence had a great advantage.

Mayor Mowat said that he had discussed with J. M. Campbell the question of getting outside power. Mr. Campbell had decided views upon the point, and the speaker advised that the board's power committee not together and consider the matter. The president intimated that there is at present about 4,000 horse power in use at present in the city for manufacturing purposes. There would shortly be an addition of another thousand, making in all 5,000 horse power. Should cheaper power be acquired, this amount might be doubled. Dr. Ryan pointed out that cheaper power was being secured in Belleville and in Brockville, and it was time that Kingston took action along the same line. Mr. Campbell was the one who could give the board the most information, and it should have him present to discuss the matter.

On motion of Dr. Ryan, seconded by Major Carruthers, the board decided to tender William Lesslie some kind of testimonial in recognition of his success in the arduous undertaking of floating the steamship Bavarinn. The board of trade is to be the hands of the president, the secretary and the treasurer, who will report their recommendation at the board's meeting next week. Dr. Ryan spoke of Mr. Lesslie's great accomplishment, and of the honor he had brought to his native City of Kingston, whose citizens were justly proud of him.

AT THE GRAND. H. B. Irving in "The Lyons Mail." H. B. "The Wayward Son." Neil Twomey, the author of "The Wayward Son," claims to have a comedy drama, many of the scenes of which might easily be read to advantage from the pulpit. Pure in its theme and instructive as well, not a single sentimental situation has been sacrificed to the whimsical and such rapid succession, that the audience is at a loss to understand how such a thing is possible. There is a comedy line interwoven in the plot, which brings the spectator from tears to laughter in a single speech—in fact, "The Wayward Son" may easily be called a play with a tear.

Dispute Over Right Of Way. Eobert Avery and Francis Fortuna are farmers and neighbors in the county of Leeds. Now trouble has arisen over a right of way. Avery claims that the road is a piece of property that had been in use as a roadway for many years. An action was brought by Avery, and was tried at Brockville before Judge Clate in March last. Judgment was given for Avery, allowing him \$5 damages for the trespass, and declaring that Fortuna is not entitled to a right of way over the lands in question. The defendant is now appealing to the divisional court. Judgment was reserved.

## IN BEST OF SPIRITS ARE THE MEN AT KINGSTON FOUNDRY.

New Boat Receives a Start--Larger Gauge Being Taken on, Though This is Called the Dull Season. A Whig representative was shown through the various shops which constitute the Kingston Foundry to-day. The men all seem in the best of spirits over the prospects of steady work for nearly a year to come. The new boat for the Huntville and Lake of Bays Navigation company has received a start. She is to be a modern screw steamer, 125 feet long, and will be built entirely at the Kingston Foundry. The boilers and engine have been begun, and the steel frame will be started immediately. This is usually the dull season at the foundry, but this season the owners contemplate putting on larger gauges as they are so busy. In two weeks' time there will be five small steamers on the ways for a thorough overhauling, and contracts have been placed for an exceptionally large number of gasoline engines, ranging from one and one-half to fifteen horse power.

IN POLICE COURT. Con. Millan Fined \$20 and Costs To-Day. Found guilty on a charge of keeping his bar open on Sunday last, Con. Millan, proprietor of the Iroquois Hotel, was this morning, fined \$20 and costs, by Magistrate Farrell at the police court. Charles E. Webster acted in behalf of License Inspector Wright, who made the complaint, and W. F. Nickle appeared in behalf of the accused.

Russell Cousins, the bartender, said on the Sunday mentioned, he was at the hotel from twelve o'clock until three. He admitted having gone into the bar, but stated that he went there to get a package of cigarettes. He did not lock the door after he went in. Witness said that he was all dressed ready to go out on the street when he went into the bar for the cigarettes.

Licence Inspector Wright told of having visited the hotel. He was walking along Ontario street, he said, when he saw a man at the front door make a quick move, as he termed it, and that made him rather suspicious, and he walked into the hotel. The door of the bar-room was unlocked, and he found the bartender in the bar-room. He had said to the bartender, "This is rather a shave." The bartender was dressed in his Sunday clothes, he said, and did not appear as if he had gone into the street to get his cigarettes. On Sunday night witness had Mr. Cousins in the street, and the latter had told him that he went into the bar to get some cigarettes.

To Mr. Nickle, the inspector stated that he saw no glasses at the bar and that he saw no one in the bar. The inspector remarked that the charge had been made in an endeavor to put a stop to the loose way in which some bar-rooms are kept, and to remain open. When he had entered the hotel on Sunday, he had heard a shouting noise as of people making their way out of the hotel. The magistrate said that so far as the act was concerned regarding the closing of bar-rooms, the bartender might just as well have gone in for a drink as the cigarettes. He accordingly fined the accused guilty and imposed a fine of \$20 and costs.

The charge against John Sid—that of assaulting and ill-treating Victoria Shatelin, wife of the Assyrian peddler, took a sudden drop. When the case was called Mrs. Shatelin and her father, who had lodged the complaint, announced to the magistrate that they did not care to press the charge and the magistrate dismissed the case. Sid will appear on Monday next to answer to the charge of theft made against him by George Hasnam. The court room was crowded with Assyrians.

Benjamin Smith was accused of assaulting and ill-treating his wife, Charlotte Smith, but neither parties put in an appearance, and the case was adjourned. The couple live on Barrie street. Summons for the case were issued Tuesday.

# THE CITIZEN LEAGUE Report of Nominating Committee Adopted

## To Promote By-Law Reducing Tavern Licenses to Twenty, and Shop Licenses to Four.

A meeting of the Citizens' League, organized a week ago, was held last night at the Y.M.C.A. In the absence of Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, through illness, Rev. C. E. Manning was voted to the chair, and the proceedings were opened with prayer by Rev. G. A. Mackenzie. The report of the nominating committee, appointed at the organization was afterwards presented and adopted. H. A. Calvin was nominated for the position of president of the League, but withdrew. The matter of selecting a president was referred back to the nominating committee. The officers elected were: Vice-president, F. King, barrister; secretary, Alfred Stokes; treasurer, W. J. Crothers.

Some Recommendations. The committee's report contained the following: "Recommend that the immediate work of the league shall be to promote a by-law reducing tavern licenses to twenty, and shop licenses to four." "That we take steps to canvass the electors and obtain their pledges to vote for no candidate in the municipal elections, who does not promise to support a by-law for such a reduction of licenses." "To carry out the foregoing the committee recommend that ward committees be appointed. The committee also recommend that the following be appointed chairman of ward committees: Sydenham ward, Dr. Anolin; Ontario

ward, R. W. Allan; Rideau, J. A. Gardiner; Cataract, W. J. Crothers; Frontenac, H. H. Godwin; St. Lawrence, D. Laidlaw, vice, W. H. Dyde; Victoria, W. A. Chown. "The committee nominate the following as a finance committee: W. J. Crothers (chairman); B. W. Robertson, H. A. Calvin, H. W. Richardson, G. Y. Chown. "The committee recommend that the members of the league consist of those who sign the constitution, and pay a membership fee of twenty-five cents.

Form Of Pledge. The league adopted the following form of pledge: "I hereby pledge myself to vote for such candidates for the city council of Kingston at the coming January elections in preference to any others, who will pledge themselves to support a by-law providing for the reduction of hotel licenses in the city to twenty, and shop licenses to four." "The league will ask the co-operation of all benevolent, fraternal, philanthropic and religious societies, both Protestant and Catholic. The members talked over plans for the campaign, and decided to hold another meeting on Tuesday night next. Some of the members of the W.C.T.U. were present at the meeting. It was stated that there are some thirty hundred lady voters in the city, and it is proposed to have these voters canvassed in behalf of the league by the members of the W. C. T. U.
