BRITISH SOUTH AFRICAN COMPANY Offers Salvation Army 1,000,000 Acres in Rhodesia, Free For Colonization Purposes. London, Dec. 1.-According to the Throne, a society journal, unless Belgium, within two months, gives satisfactory assurances to Great Britain of better government in the Congo Independent state, Great Britain and France, jointly, will summon a European conference to consider the matter.

The British South African company offered the Salvation Army a million acres of land in Rhodesia, free of charge, for colonization purposes, with the stipulation, however, that should the colonizing scheme prove a failure, the land should revert to the company.
