**FROM THE PULPITS  
 ORDINATION OF ELDERS IN  
 CHALMERS.**

Individual Communion Cup to Be  
 Used. There For the First  
 Time—Services in Various  
 Other Churches.

In Chalmers church, at the Sunday  
 morning service, took place the ordi-  
 nation of newly-elected elders, name-  
 ly, Rev. Alexander Laird, L. E.  
 Staples, and Prof. John Matheson.  
 Rev. Dr. Macpherson officiated. The  
 Kirk session and the new elders occu-  
 pied the two front pews. Rev. Dr.  
 Ross, assisted in the service, delivering  
 the ordination prayer. Following the  
 ordination service, the elder members  
 of the session filed around the front  
 pews and shook hands with their new-  
 ly-ordained brethren.

Dr. Macpherson then ascended to  
 the pulpit and delivered a short ser-  
 mon upon "Prophetic church gov-  
 ernment, the duties of elders and the  
 great honor it was to be a part of the  
 congregation to attend to their  
 spiritual wants. His text was I  
 (Chronicles ix, 27): And they lodged  
 about the house of God, because the  
 charge was upon them.

Next Sunday morning the individual  
 communion cup will be used for  
 the first time in Chalmers church, in  
 connection with the first time of the  
 congregation, by a large vote, having  
 decided in favor of its introduction.

 of the text is not found in that  
 lowest needs of man are met by the  
 gospel of the Son of God, but rather  
 that it meets the highest ideals of man  
 in his most perfect intellectual de-  
 velopment. The Lord Jesus Christ  
 and His gospel stand as a constant  
 beacon on the path of life, and in  
 the higher needs which come to man.  
 The faith which Jesus has brought  
 into this world has become the  
 constant, permanent, and un-  
 changing light of the world. The religion  
 which failed to satisfy would not be  
 such. And as the meanness would de-  
 velop, he finds he cannot do more  
 and more. Christ is the same  
 yesterday, to-day and forever. Yet in  
 a sense there is a Christ of yesterday.  
 More than that, the Christ of yester-  
 day and the Christ of to-day are  
 one and the same. The Christ of to-  
 day is the Christ of yesterday.

**THE POWER QUESTION.**

Some of the Things That Have  
 to Be Considered.  
 There are some leading citizens who  
 do not think that Kingston is in a  
 position to be brought up to date in  
 the Trent river power question. They say  
 that the hydro-electric commission is  
 not going to develop the power.  
 The hydro-electric commission will have  
 to do that themselves. It is estimated  
 that Kingston would have to pay  
 \$250,000 at the very least, for the  
 power here. The wire line would alone  
 cost \$180,000.

One citizen said: "Is Kingston pre-  
 pared to invest that amount of money  
 for a power plant?" The  
 \$250,000 rate for a horse power, of  
 course, includes the interest on the  
 investment. That amount is what the  
 power could be delivered for at a  
 central station in Kingston. The only  
 way that would reduce the invest-  
 ment would be the opening of the  
 Trent canal, by the Dominion govern-  
 ment, which would, necessarily, have  
 to build the dams. Otherwise, a  
 company would have to do that at a  
 big cost."

**OUR QUEEN'S NOTES**

ELECTIONS THE BEST CON-  
 DUCTED IN YEARS.

Science and Medicine Win the  
 Victory Over Arts—A Little  
 Hard Feeling Over the Ladies'  
 Vote is Felt.

The Association Society sent a  
 wreath to be placed on the casket  
 containing the body of a late member,  
 Dr. Charles Lawlor. The students  
 themselves attended the funeral in a  
 body.

The Alma Mater Society elections  
 are now a thing of the past, and  
 without a doubt they were the best  
 conducted in years. This is especially  
 the case when viewed from the stand-  
 point of serious business. The mem-  
 bers of these two faculties united  
 on a common slate against the brethren  
 in arts, and by the most thorough  
 systematic understanding for some  
 time, carried the day by large major-  
 ities. This alliance resulted from the  
 recognized fact that neither faculty  
 could unaided elect its nominees, nar-  
 ticularly when the antagonistic ladies'  
 vote was taken into consideration.

Work at the polls concluded at six  
 o'clock, after an afternoon of hur-  
 rying and carrying about the city for  
 voters who needed a little persuasion.  
 Then followed a brief interval for at-  
 tending to the wants of the inner man  
 after which the students returned to  
 Convocation hall, reaching it to the  
 doors from the gallery overhead, lan-  
 tern slides were thrown upon a canvas  
 screen. Here many cartoons of student  
 life, and well-known students and  
 members of the faculty were presented.

While Miss Turner came in for  
 her share of the applause. Soon the  
 results from the several polls began  
 to arrive, and they in turn were  
 thrown upon the screen. The pres-  
 ence of the ladies, and resulted as  
 follows:

President, Cameron, 48; Ramsey, 52.  
 Vice-president, Matheson, 101; Cardin,  
 22. Secretary, McAnnam, 60; Stid-  
 well, 72. Critic, Woolsey, 26; Bryden,  
 100. Treasurer, Mansfield, 102; Mur-  
 phy, 27. Assistant secretary, Cooke,  
 31; McAnnam, 95. Executive commit-  
 tee, Hale, 66; McGillivray, 77; Gar-  
 den, 41; Aiken, 76; Bow, 53; Men-  
 zies, 55.

Needless to say these results were  
 hard hit against the medicals and  
 science men, the only candidate mak-  
 ing anything like a fair showing be-  
 ing Cameron for the presidency, and  
 He's and Aiken for commonwealth.

where the caution of four votes was  
 allowable. Of course, Miss Lawman  
 counted on to show a little antago-  
 nistic feeling toward the "outsiders,"  
 but she need not have been so com-  
 placent. It caused the boys considerable  
 worry in polling down the heavy  
 majorities placed against their men,  
 and best time in constant fear lest  
 the election be decided, or rather  
 the electorate who are most interest-  
 ed in Alma Mater Society matters,  
 and who exercise franchise, should be

When the results were announced,  
 it became known that still another  
 roll was to be heard from a mighty  
 geyser, for with the majorities  
 the ladies' roll pulled down it  
 set a slight victory for the medicals and  
 science men. In fact they carried every  
 roll by record majorities, with the  
 single exception of that at which  
 the medicals, the ladies, voted. In the  
 race for the presidency, Cameron's  
 election was never in doubt. The final  
 results were as follows:

 Hale, (med.), 506; J. Aiken, (science),  
 539; Bow, (arts), 392; Menzies, (arts),
