#### How The Matter Stands.

There are three phases of the agitation in England with regard to the education bill which has not yet left the House of Lords.

The first is the attitude of the Archbishop of Westminster. He is willing to reconsider the bill, but will not recede from one position, which is his at once and forever. There must, he says, be some provision for religious teaching in the schools, by teachers selected by the bishops, and the voluntary schools must have their share of the public money.

The second is the attitude of the unionists. Mr. Balfour says they are eager for an appeal to the people with the education bill as the issue. But Lord Lansdowne, a former Liberal and now a Unionist, is disposed to make concessions and to avoid the irritation which would follow the conflict of the Lords and Commons.

The third is the position of the Liberal party as a whole. It will not brook the dictation of the Lords and work, the evident repudiation of its work, which is based on an election promise.

The result may be a compromise when the houses, through their leaders, confer, and in the present temper of the people if there is any back-slowing it will be by the peers.

#### Cure For Pneumonia

Time was when the consumptive was housed as much as possible and away from the cold air. Now the patient who desires to be healed of the disease hies himself away to where the air is fresh, pure and cold, and he breathes it in all the while, both night and as day.

Pneumonia is being similarly treated, according to recent clinics. The Boston Medical and Surgical Journal refers to a case where a cure was effected by the patient being kept in a cold air and fed on a diet of cold water. "The treatment is no more heroic than the cold bath which is commended for a typhoid fever patient, when, according to the practice of some years ago, that would have meant his death.

The Stellar Ray quotes this as an appropriate conclusion: "There are only three 'cures' in the world—yes, four; pure air, pure water, pure food, and a contented mind. Let the world learn this simple lesson and disease will fly from the face of the earth, and drug stores will sell stationery, stamps and tooth brushes." There is a clincher of Christian Science about this, though it is not the saying of one of this cult. It is the saying of one who holds that the scientists, however, have opened the pathway for that progress which is his aim and anxiety.

#### A Very Timely Meeting.

The fact that Hon. W. Scott, premier of Saskatchewan, accompanied by W. L. King, the deputy minister of Interior, went from Lethbridge to Indianapolis, to confer with John Mitchell on the miners' strike, has caused some queer comments.

"How the eagle would scream if the governor of an American state were invited to come to Canada and ask a British subject to call off the strike and give the people coal," says the Toronto Telegram. "Internationalism may be labor's only means of defence against capital, but patriots have little cause for pride in the spectacle of the native heads of a coal tract or the alien head of a labour trust having more power over the fuel supply of a province than all the governments in Canada put together."

Let us recall for the moment the strike of the Pennsylvania miners three years ago. A greater than a state governor took a hand in the settlement of it—the president himself. Mr. Roosevelt could not leave Washington for the scene of the difficulty—political and national difficulties kept him at home—but he sent for the coal barons, and for the head of the miners' union, this same John Mitchell, and sought his influence toward the bringing about of peace.

It is not for a moment to be understood that a provincial premier and a government official, in Canada, are demeaning themselves by a conference the outcome of which carries with it so much meaning to so many people. Mr. Mitchell has proved himself the equal of any who have come in contact with him, and the superior of many. If Mr. Scott and Mr. King went to him on a special mission, it was because they believed that he, more than anyone else, could assist them in finding a solution of the labour difficulty.

T. Lindsay, Ottawa, and a prominent man in Ontario mining affairs, has disposed of his 9,000 shares in Cobalt City for \$30,500.

#### Fire Insurance Rates.

The fire insurance underwriters are disposed to have things pretty much their own way. They hold that they are not making as much money as some people imagine, and the returns they make to parliament afford some evidence in support of this contention.

Toronto's great fire, consuming buildings by the block, and involving a loss which ran into the millions, supports the companies in their demand for higher rates and the best possible protection from fire. But Toronto should not expect the other cities in Ontario to share its burden. Toronto is in this position a peculiar one, that it is allowed to assess the fire companies on income through the head office. It gets the benefit, then, of any taxation which is permissible so far as the revenue of these fire companies are concerned. The fire companies are, therefore, contributing to the efficiency of the fire department of Toronto, and to this department only.

At the same time the fire insurance companies dictate to the other municipalities as to how they shall manage their fire departments so that the lowest possible loss will be incurred or sustained by conflagrations. They direct that certain improvements must be undertaken or the classification of the city's risks will be lowered. If the income from the fire insurance companies were assessable here there would be more reason in this dictation.

Kingston has not been a drag upon the fire insurance companies surely. The losses have not exceeded \$5,000 a year for the last five years, and this is but a small return for the annual premiums that are paid and assessed in Toronto.

#### Editorial Notes.

A great soap combine, representing sixty millions of dollars, has been dissolved. The people boycotted it. Public opinion killed it. It is a unique experience.

It is proposed in England to double the succession duties, and contribute the product in part to old age pensions. That would be one way of making the rich take care of the poor.

Dr. Beattie Nobilt has accepted the presidency of the Farmers' Bank. Will the government ask him to resign his public office? Can a tory registrar break the registry act with impunity?

The proposed union of the maritime provinces is not considered "in practical politics." But it is proposed to brooch the matter in the legislatures and see how it will take. The result may be imagined.

The counsel for the government, in the Bill of Pulp and Paper, is the distinguished candidate for the legislature in the conservative interest. Just how impartial he would be one can imagine.

Some of the advertising which certain artists of the stage are getting is regarded as "the publicity." It is a mild expression. If called the "excess of innoscenty" the truth would be more clearly expressed.

When next the North-West (including the two new provinces), has a general election there will be seventeen members, where, some years ago, there were only four. Is it any wonder that public opinion in the west is being consulted?
