He and a fellow workman were trying some cartridges in a revolver, when a cartridge exploded. It is not known whether or not the wound will prove fatal.

Gananoque, Ont., Dec. 4.—The barns and outbuildings on Hickory Island, owned by J. Walker Wood, of New York, were destroyed by fire. Fifty pedigreed fowl were saved.

A Bandit's Act.

Topeka, Kas., Dec. 4.—A lone bandit made an unsuccessful attempt to hold up a west-bound Santa Fe train, out of Kansas City, last night. Several shots were fired, but no one was hurt. The robber escaped.

Weyler Back At Old Post.

Mudrik, Dec. 4.—King Alfonso has approved of a new ministry under the leadership of the Marquis de Aranjaz, in which Gen. Weyler resumes his old post as minister of war.

ARE NOT YET CERTAIN

THAT A COMMISSION WILL GO TO NEW YORK

To Find Out Where the Funds of the Defunct Ontario Bank Have Gone—McGill's Counsel Against Commission Going.

Toronto, Dec. 4.—Because a faculty affidavit was produced before Judge Winchester, this morning, it is not yet certain that a commission will go to New York to find out where the funds of the defunct Ontario Bank have gone. Arguments for such a commission was heard before the judge, this morning, but the affidavit produced by Edward Bailey, acting for the crown attorney, was not complete, in that it did not reveal the source of information, and a further adjournment was made till tomorrow. R. E. McKay, counsel for McGill, the late general manager of the bank, argued that the sending of the commission could serve no useful purpose.

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A STEAMER MISSING

THERE IS FEAR FOR THE HICKOX.

She Left Oswego, N.Y., on Sunday For Belleville and Has Not Been Reported From Belleville.

A despatch from Belleville, Ont., says: Grave fears are felt here that the steamer Hickox, owned and commanded by Capt. Smith, of this city, has been lost on Lake Ontario. The vessel left Oswego on Sunday, loaded with coal for Belleville, and has not yet turned up. A steamer which left after her arrival lately at Pictou, it is hoped that the Hickox may be ice-bound somewhere, but the worst is feared. She had a crew of five Belleville people.
