EARLY DAYS IN KINGSTON ARE RECALLED.

Mrs. Watts Was Born in This City Just a Little Over Seventy-Three Years Ago-Constant Reader of the Whig.

been the lot of Mrs. Robert Watts, 32 Division street, Mrs. Watts was born in Kingston just a little over Seventy-three years, ago, and it is now a great pleasure for her to talk over old times and more particularly the stirring events in this city over sixty years ago, which she can readily recollect. Mrs. Watts is still in comparatively good health, and her friends wish for her many more years of happiness. She was formerly Annie Boiselle, and her parents were at Quebee during the revolutionary trouble, and moved to Kingston at that time. "It is wonderful to note the changes in Kingston since those early days, said Mrs. Watts to a Whig representative yesterday. "There were certainly some stirring times, and I shall never forget them.

Mrs. Watts lived for a long time in Barriefield, and she recalls the many ights which occurred in those early days between sailors and soldiers. "I can remember well one day when bor here," said Mrs. Watts, "The af fair took place during the night there was no one in the vessel.

that was a lucky thing too. It happened in this way. The steamer which was blown up had arrived with gunpowder for the soldiers and was lying roughy in the harbor. Mrs. Watts says that the drinking that went on was the direct cause of the many fierce hand-to-hand battles engaged in by soldiers and sailors. At that time there were six hotels in Barrieffield, and it, no doubt, would have been rather difficult to count the number of places in which liquor could be purchased in Kingston. "There was always trouble at the horse races in those days," said Mrs. Watts, "and often the soldiers had to be called out to quell disturbances.
