**The Breaking Of Promises.**

It will pay the Whitney government to be definite in its policy. On the question of education it has not been candid or consistent. When it decided to establish Normal schools in which to finish the education of those who are qualifying for the teaching profession, it should have planted those where they would be of most service to the province. Kingston being an educational centre had reason to expect one of the schools, and indirectly was promised it.

The government went further and asked about a site, which indicated that this promise, indirectly given, would be carried out. Then the government considered the political effects of a distribution of patronage, and acted accordingly. The school promised to Kingston went to Peterboro. Kingston disappointed the government in the bye-election and was hopelessly abandoned. Peterboro was liberal, and in the last election went conservative. It has been bribed to remain conservative by the gift of a Normal school.

Hamilton was offended by the ordered removal of the Normal College to Toronto. To placate it a technical school or college was promised in its place. Hamilton was troubled, too, by the giving of a prison labour contract when the people were promised that prison labour would not be hired out. The promise was made that this contract would be cancelled. Yet no minister, or person in the government's behalf, or with its authority, made announcement respecting the school or college and prison labour contract. The government can say that it did not make any promises and cannot be accused now of breaking them—if it does not give Hamilton a technical college or cancel the labour contract.

The Whitney government will learn, if it has not already learned, that it had better not trifle unduly with the people. It cannot dodge the responsibility of refusing to recognize the statements that are made in its behalf. It knew what was being said about the Normal school in Kingston, and it knew what was said more recently in Hamilton on the college and prison labour questions. It cannot evade the displeasure which follows any repudiation of its promises.

**Best Man For Council.**

The municipal elections are approaching, and are in fact quite near, and it is fit and proper that the people should canvass the situation clearly and critically. The great question before them is not the social or political status of any individual, but his qualification for the office to which he aspires.

It is a more promising sign that some of the candidates for public office have been asked to enter the election as the representative of the people, and it would be a great thing if only those entered the contest for whose services there was a manifest demand in the ward or the city. The best men are not seeking the honors that are associated with membership in the council. They are pressed into the campaign sometimes very reluctantly.

Hamilton, which is attracting a good deal of attention at present, has set the pace in one notable respect. The board of trade is interested in the public business. Its members are disposed to consider the matter of civic representation and management in a purely non-political light, and they are moving to put into nomination for the council some of the men who have made a success of their own business and who give assurance, therefore, of making a success of the people's business.

There is a good spirit in a movement like this, and if the board of trade interested itself in the municipal elections, in the same way, there would be something probably to show for it in an improvement in the membership of the council.

Dr. Pyne, minister of education, says that Hamilton will get a technical school. He would have made this announcement sooner, but he did not want to influence the bye-election. Since when has he become so thoughtful and considerate?

The Hamilton Herald regards the East Hamilton bye-election as "a stinging rebuke to the government." A change in the vote from 565, in favour of the government candidate to 831 against it, is merely a most remarkable turn-over of votes.
