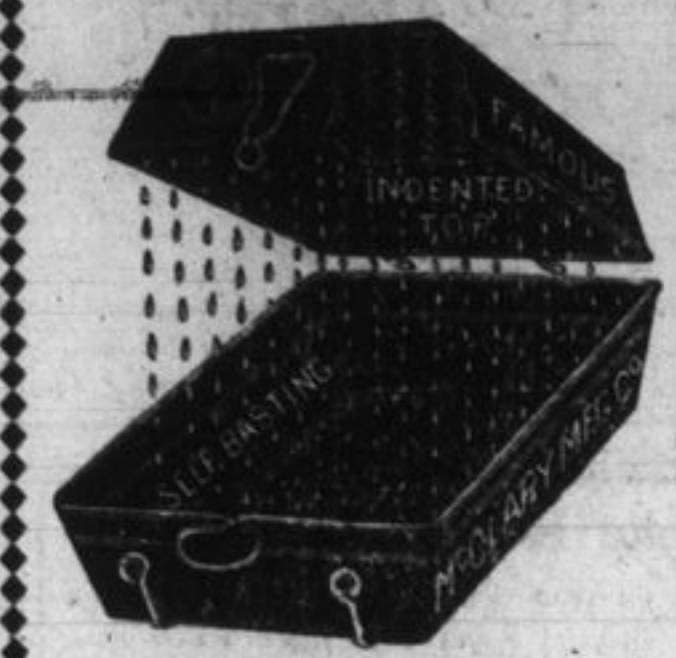

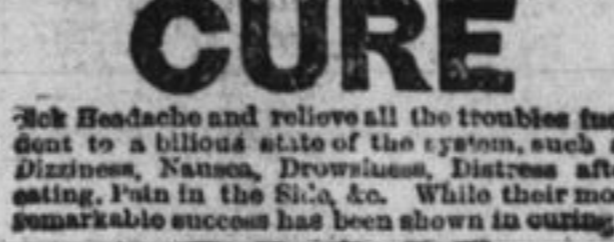

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THE SPORT REVIEW

TIGER'S SUCCESS DUE TO COACH ELLIOTT.

This is the Young Man Who Stood on the Side-Line—Brockville Wants a District Honorary.

The Ottawa Free Press says: The Hamilton Tigers are inevitable because of the variety of tactics they adopt to gain an end, and the perfection with which each change of play is carried out. That is where "Chaucer" Elliott comes in. Some of the men on the Tiger team may only carry whiplash muscles upon the field, supported by well trained bodies; but Mr. Elliott's brains have worked out elaborate plans for the advantageous use of those muscles and bodies. This quiet and unostentatious man, who stands on the side-line, is the author of combination in play which are so varied, and are executed by his men with such precision, that he has his opponents guessing half the time. Backing the line, for example, is usually the resource of one or two men on a team, and is often a thing of chance. The player simply lowers his head and plunges along until he is stopped. Elliott has six or eight men trained to hit the line, singly or in tandem, and at many points. You can never tell whether the player with the ball is going to try and get around the line, dash into it, or make a pass. It all depends upon the signal which the captain has given before the scrimmage. The "criss-cross" is not new on the gridiron, but it is new in Canada as worked by the Tigers. "Chaucer" has taught it to his men, and they carry it out as prettily as a trained ballet corps would execute some pretty movement on the stage. They turned on the zigzag business on Saturday half a dozen times, and it was worth going to Montreal to see. If our Ottawa team would work out plays of that nature they would have the people of this red-hot starting town in convulsions during the football season. It says to be up-to-date to have a "Chaucer" Elliott infusing grey matter into the game.

Basketball at Y.M.C.A.

Two name games for the members challenge cup were played at the Y.M.C.A. last night, before a good attendance of enthusiastic spectators.

Punctually at 8 p.m., the St. James and Britannias faced each other as follows: St. James Club—E. Partridge, Moxley, F. F. Partridge, Atkinson, A. Dennison.

At half time, the score was St. James Club, 17; Britannias, 15; and at full time it stood Britannias, 34; St. James Club, 26.

The teams started in playing excellent ball. The Wanderers showing better form than their heavier opponents. Saunders, the captain of the Wanderers, was easily the star, scoring eight baskets for his team. Enthusiasts think that the struggle for the cup will end between these two teams, for although the Maple Leaves were defeated, they are heavier than their opponents, and as soon as they get in shape, ought to easily account for the lighter teams in the league.

The officials at last night's contests were: Charles Moxley and H. Smith, umpires; J. Hunter, timekeeper.

Rugby.

Secretary Joe Hay of the O.R.F.U. said yesterday: "The indications are that the Canadian rules will be adopted at the annual meeting of the O.R.F.U. on Saturday. All four senior teams favor the abolition of the snap-back, while Kingston and a couple of other clubs favor the new rules, and if they all vote the way they are now talking the Burnside code is doomed."

Hockey.

North Bay has a new \$19,000 rink with all modern conveniences. In a game of hockey at the Prince's Club, London, Eng., the London Canadians defeated Oxford University 3 goals to 0.

If suitable arrangements can be made with the rink management Hamilton will play a team in the immediate series of the O. H. A. this winter. A number of first class players have located in the city during the past year and are anxious to get in the game.

Since Wanderers of Montreal have strengthened up, the prevailing opinion in Ottawa, is they will defeat Keora in the Stanley cup games. Wanderers are a hard problem on their own ice as is evidenced by their record of only having lost one game in two seasons at the Arena.

KING CAN'T PREVENT

Marlborough's Troubles Getting Into Courts.

London, Dec. 7.—The marital troubles of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough are bound to come into the courts for settlement, as all hopes of a friendly agreement are gone, according to the Manchester Dispatch. The duke, it states, regards himself as the injured party and is insisting on securing "his rights."

New York Sun: A curious fact came to light last Saturday as a result of the "experience" meeting of several members of the rules committee in Philadelphia, Dr. Newton, the former Pennsylvania end, held a stop watch on the plays in the Army-Navy game, and found that in the first half, there were just six minutes and forty-eight seconds of actual play, and in the second half six minutes and forty seconds—twelve minutes and twenty-eight seconds in all. By actual play is meant the time the ball was "alive." It means the time consumed from the moment the leather was snapped back to the moment it was dead. It was the time consumed in passing the ball back and in kicking and rushing. The rest of the sixty minutes—this aside from the time taken out for delays—was consumed in lining up, in men getting to their position for each succeeding scrimmage, and giving signals.
