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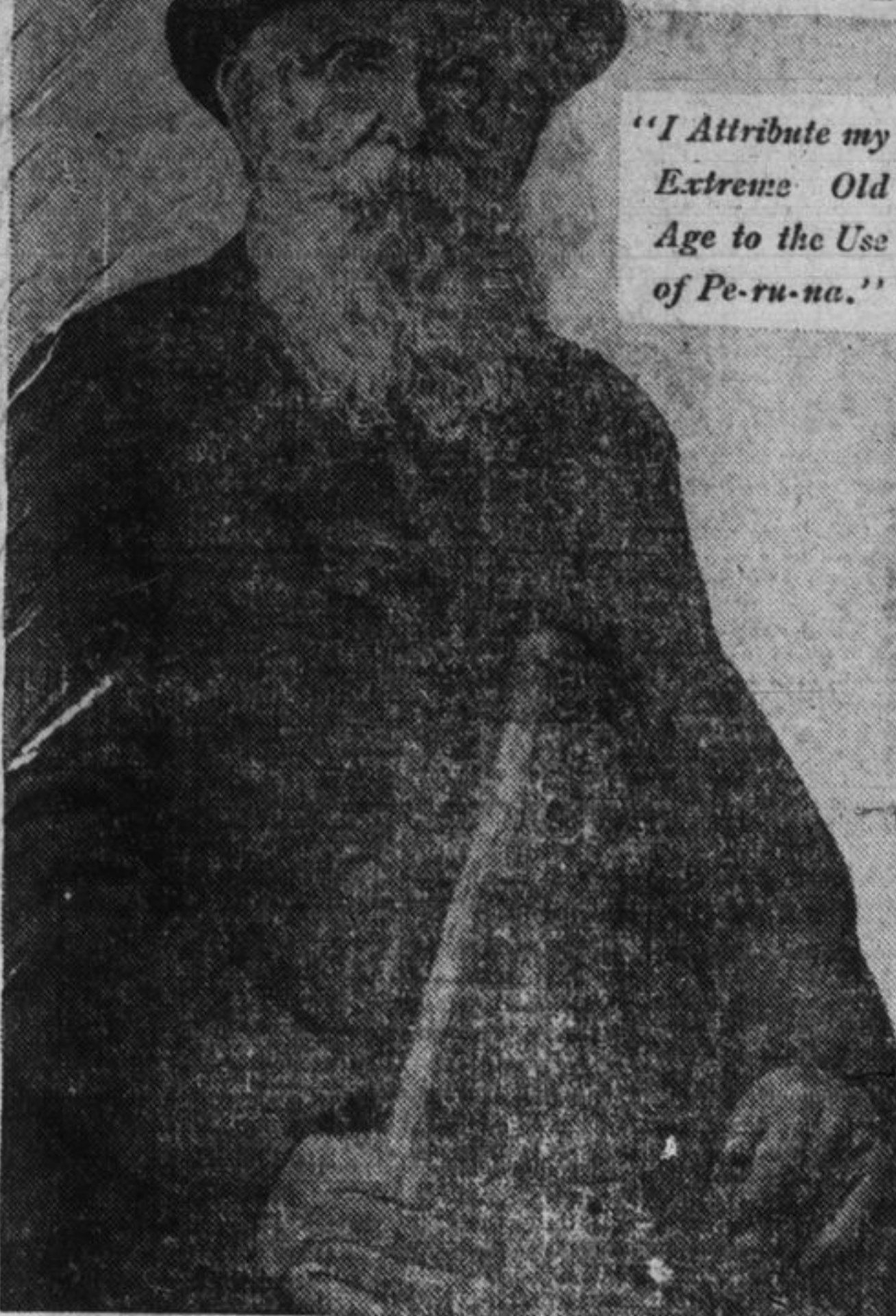

ONLY SOLUTION OF CAPITAL AND LABOR PROBLEM.

Christian Scientists Seem to Have Grasped Some Needful Truths - But They Seem to Have Omitted Some Others.

Kingston, Dec. 3. (To the Editor): I had the pleasure of listening to a lecture on Christian Science, Sunday afternoon, in the Opera House. There was a good sized audience and some little noise caused by the people going in and out, and as I sat near the front of the auditorium, down stairs, I could not catch all the speaker said. However, I learned that Christian Science claims to be the only true religion, and that it is based on the "infinite essence," or on appearances for the truth, and appearances are always false. The spiritualist and the materialist alike are wrong, because depending on the finite senses for evidence of the truth. Christian Science, apparently, ignores the law of matter or material things, and recognizing spirit as the only visible, yet tangible power, as truth. Now, I am not going to attempt to report this lecture, much of which I agree with, and especially the reference to the false economic system of the world. The strike between capital and labor, and the final settlement will only be by having "one universal union." That means socialism, however attained, whether by Christian Science, or any other science. Christian Scientists have evidently grasped some of the meaning of Christ, and so claim to be the only true exponents of the light, but they try to give to the world, but they will be a long time trying to make the world believe that Mrs. Eddy is the fountain of all truth, or that their philosophy contains no error. This is an age of science, religion, and philosophy, rather, if you dig deep, you will find it is an age of old religions in new dresses, and in the phrase of D. J. Moody, the late evangelist, "you can take your pick," and for my part, I would not be Christian Science, but it would be that philosophy or science which explains most, which answers most, of the perplexing problems of life, and that is what is called modern spiritualism, or spiritual science. I perceive that it is no use to argue with a Christian Scientist about this or any other subject in which mortal man is interested, for he puts himself beyond the pale of reason by assuming that his finite senses are all false, that nothing we conceive of by them is true. He is forced to take this ground to maintain his theory, namely, that the history of Christ, of Science to every other form of thought. It is a wily position to take, for by it he can, with a mere wave of the hand, brush aside all other aspirants to knowledge and truth by any other way. But still we will protest that this is surely not the height of wisdom. Nor is it the scientific position to take. Spiritual science, or spiritualism, recognizes the divinity in material things, and that spirit and matter are not separate, but that they are together to produce the perfect manifestation. There is a oneness of spirit life as manifested in all life. All material conditions are but manifestations of the spiritual law. I understood the speaker to say, that "there is no spirit in man that can leave the body at all, assuming that his finite senses are wrong when they claim that spirits return and communicate with mortals. It is a delusion of their senses." He said, also, that "there is a natural body and there is a spiritual body." And is there no individual life, after death? If the Christian Scientist is right, several of the evidence of the finite senses we could prove to him that there is individual, personal life after death, and that these spirits do come back, under the conditions of laws, and communicate with us still in the flesh. Let us give an example. Last summer I took a pair of trousers as my own, and cleaned and cleaned with me to a man who did not know me, my name, nor where I came from. The slates did not get the names but could not possibly have produced the result under the circumstances. I will give one message by a well-known and estimated former Kingstonian. The writing has been recognized by more than one besides myself, as that of the man who signs his name to it. Not only the writing, but the character or style of the composition is his. This I will leave to your readers to judge, none of whom know the man well. "Dear Sir, my name was correctly given." "Does it surprise you to receive a letter or hear from me? I can assure you I haven't just come from the cemetery. I am no spectre, neither am I a resurrected body out of the valley of dry bones, but a real person from a substantial state of life, and I see and know you. Help me to come to the point where I am dead and buried. I am, - - -" The name was signed with a flourish or scroll, and dotted as was his custom, being an expert penman. The signers to none of the other messages attempted anything approaching that. Handwriting is considered one of the best methods to identify a person. But the testimony of the senses are no use. Of course, if I don't know whether I heard a lecture yesterday afternoon or not, then this evidence of

Ten times as much progress has been made by this year's council as by last year's, as will later be conclusively shown. For instance it was this year's council that tackled the light plant extensions, which the council of 1905 feared to undertake. The neglected road repairs by the board of works of 1905 were undertaken by the board of this year, which has done as much as it possibly could to patch the bad spots.

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

LAST TIME OF OLD SYSTEM OF ELECTION

Of Aldermen - Hereafter, Only Seven Will Be Elected Each Year - Light Plant Financial Statement to Be Presented.

The municipal elections in Kingston next month will be under the old system of complete council election for the last time. By virtue of the recent special act passed by the Ontario legislature, the aldermen in each ward receiving the highest vote will retain his seat for three years; the next highest for two years and the third for one year. Hence in January, 1908, seven aldermen will retire from the council, and there will be one alderman elected in each ward for three years. The following year, the term of the next seven will expire, and seven will be elected for three year terms. Thus, each year one alderman will be elected for each ward. It is thus hoped to make the council a stronger body by making the committees more continuous. The new system is the same as that of the board of education. The aldermanic candidates in January will all strive to head the poll.
