A SAVING OF \$5,000
ON THE ESTIMATED COST OF THE EXTENSIONS.

To the Light Plant—Most of the Extensions Completed—A Vote of Appreciation of Ald. Toye's Good Services.
The civic Light Committee met yesterday afternoon, in attendance were Aldermen Toye (chairman), Givens, Bassam and Gaskin.
A statement was submitted by Manager J. M. Campbell, showing the expenditures upon the gas and electric extensions. The statement of the year's receipts and expenditure in connection with gas and electric distribution was not ready, but Chairman Toye said that the receipts were greatly in excess of those of last year.
The extension statement showed that after allowing for all work of previous years, there will be a surplus of probably \$5,000. In other words, the by-law provided for the expenditure of \$85,000, whereas, the extensions will cost only \$80,000.

Of the new gas mains, all but 400 feet on Brock street, and 1,100 feet on Lower Bagot street have been laid. The estimated cost of the same was \$21,420. The actual cost will be \$500 less. The gas holder was estimated at \$25,000, and will cost only \$19,000. Services, however, are more than estimated, but they will yield a revenue. There were 211 new gas services put in during the year.
The foundations for the generators cannot be put in until the present machinery is removed.
Regarding outside electrical distribution, all of the new fuses and mains of the Edison system have been erected, with the exception of a small line on Sydney street. Very little work has yet been done in rearranging the distribution of the alternating current and arc lights. It will take the better part of next summer to complete the work.
On the suggestion of Ald. Toye, Ald. Gaskin moved that the work on the spring be that of completing the gas mains on Brock and Bagot streets. This was carried.

Ald. Toye brought up the question of future extensions. At the last meeting of the committee, Ald. Elliott asked that some by-law be passed in this regard, so that there would be some definite rule to follow as to service extensions. Ald. Toye reported that there was no similarity between the light and water departments. The matter was left over for next year's committee to deal with, as Ald. Gaskin and Givens deemed it too late now to consider.

Ald. Givens claimed that there should be some one outside of the plant office's to report upon the work on hand. The same should be done on the waterworks and the kind of audit should be had on the street. In reply to a question, Ald. Toye said that there was about \$17,000 of work on hand. Stock-taking could not be done until the end of the year. Ald. Givens moved that in connection with the city audit, some means be adopted to check the stock of the plant. Ald. Bassam said that the auditor didn't know the difference between a coupling from a brass tap, and therefore, could not take stock. Some experts would be required.
Ald. Givens added to his motion that the auditor be given any local expert assistance he requires. The motion was agreed to by the committee.
The chairman reported that six new lamps would be required for new street erections. On motion of Ald. Gaskin it was decided to purchase the required lamps.

This being practically the last committee meeting of the year, Ald. Givens moved that a vote be taken on Ald. Toye's services as chairman during the year. He said that Ald. Toye had been courteous and most attentive to his committee, and that the committee had more work to do this year than all the other civic committees combined, and to the chairman was due in a large degree, the success of the year's undertakings.
Ald. Givens seconded the resolution, and paid tribute to Ald. Toye as a capable chairman. He had performed his duties with unfailing courtesy, and had made things easy for the committee members by his thorough knowledge of every detail.
Ald. Toye, in thanking his conferees for their vote of appreciation and confidence, stated that he had been well backed up by the committee in the large undertakings of the year. The committee had worked well together. At the beginning of the year, Mayor Mowat had asked that the committee be eliminated from civic affairs, and he was safe in saying that the light committee had followed out the mayor's decision in this respect. A most prosperous year had resulted in the light department, and the committee of 1906 could well be proud of its work.

Death of G. C. Gridley.
George C. Gridley, general passenger agent of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg division of the New York Central railway, died suddenly on Monday, aged fifty-six years. He removed to Watertown from Syracuse in 1898. The funeral occurs at Watertown, N.Y., on Monday. Mr. Gridley had been connected with the affairs of the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg division of the New York Central for over thirty years. He took part in developing the Thousand Island region and he lived to see the resort section of the St. Lawrence river patronized by a larger summer colony than the most optimistic hoped for twenty-five years ago.
