**KARL KREMER, THE BOGUS HEIR, LET GO.**

Strong Enough Evidence to Convict Was Not Forthcoming—A Commission to Secure It Would Have Had to Go to Germany.

Montreal, Dec. 13.—Karl Kremer, the man of the alleged fortune in Germany, took in a number of lending Montreal merchants with the story, and got loans, furniture, horses, carriages, etc., on credit, and subsequently arrested on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, is once more a free man. The case against him has fallen through on account of the difficulty of obtaining strong enough evidence against him. In order to do so it would be necessary to pay the expense of a commission to Germany to secure evidence and find the men behind the prosecution were not willing to pay for.

**COMMERCIAL MATTERS.**

What Is Going On In The Business World—The Markets.

In 1890 Australia had 100 miles of railway. Now the island continent has over 12,000 miles.

Grand trunk railway system traffic increased from Dec. 1st to Feb. 1, 1905, \$778,412; same week, 1905, \$2,29,028; increase, \$4,480.

Toronto Railway earnings the week ended December 8th, totalled \$58,237, or \$5,460.64 more than in the corresponding week last year.

The Ontario Mills Co., limited, announces an advance in the price of iron at \$1 per ton, and now quote: Bran at \$21 1/2; steel at \$22 per ton.

The November coal output of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal company was 71,045 tons, a high record. The October output, which was also a record, was only 66,000 tons.

New York capitalists have opened negotiations with the British council looking to the establishment of a steel plant, to cost \$5,000,000, and employ 2,500 hands.

Canadian failures, according to Bradstreet, for November numbered 122, a decrease of respect to 15 and 23 per cent from November, 1904.

The assets in the United States under lease this year were 755,724 and the yield \$28,594,000. In 1904 the yield was 1,103,452 and the production \$28,163,000.

The P. and O. shipping company is the greatest shipping concern in the world. Its vessels aggregate 4,000 tons, and it has 13,000,000 feet of steel travel, 2,000,000 lbs. of a year, 700,000 tons of coal and 1,000,000 nearly 2,000,000 in value.

The gross earnings of the Twin City Railroad, from the month of October to the month of November, 1905, are \$809,893, or 18.84 per cent. For the ten months ending October 31st, the company show a surplus of \$1,004,842.

The first loss of the United States and Canada for the month of November, as compiled from the Journal of Commerce, is \$1,248,254, against \$76,174,200 in November, 1904.

\$17,000 in November, 1905. Total for eleven months, \$499,728,257, against \$169,881,200 same time in 1904, and \$282,941,700 same time in 1905.

**TO HAVE COMMISSION.**

Will Go to New York and Take Evidence.

Toronto, Dec. 13.—Judge Winchester, this morning, granted a commission to go to New York to take evidence from the various brokers with whom Charles McGill had dealings. The commission was appointed in connection with the case of the witness from the Ontario Bank. The application of a commission in the case of Mr. Cockburn was abandoned. The commission will not go to New York until after Christmas. In the meantime no evidence will be taken in the police court proceedings against McGill.

**ARRESTS MADE.**

On Charges of Contempt of Court.

New York, Dec. 13.—William M. Masterson a United States deputy marshal, and William E. Lewis and Henry N. Cary, editors of the New York Morning Telegram, were arrested, charged with criminal contempt of court in circulating false and grossly libellous reports of the trial of Chester E. Gillette at Herkimer.

Masterson also was recorded as an editor of The Telegram. All three were sent to the court of general sessions.

**Formed Defence.**

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—In the Buckinham riot case, in which Albert MacLachlan and the police are charged with manslaughter, in the death of strikers killed in the riots on October 8th, the evidence of Miss Ella Smith, was very favorable to the defence. She testified on an eminence and saw the whole fight. She saw the strikers were the aggressors. She saw the distribution of rifles among the strikers and heard the cheer and call to advance. Counsel will address the magistrate this afternoon.

**Recovers \$10,000.**

Toronto, Dec. 13.—Judgment was given by Justice McMahon, to-day, in favor of the widow of John McKay, a C.P.R. fireman, killed in August last in a collision between Wabash and a C.P.R. train, near St. Thomas. The widow sued the Wabash for \$15,000, and the court allows her \$10,000.

**Suing For Balance Due.**

Toronto, Dec. 13.—The Woods-Norris Advertising Agency is suing the Cobalt Silver Mining company, and J. H. Lewis, for \$1,500 balance claimed to be due for advertising in papers in Toronto, Montreal, Kingston, Hamilton, Guelph, Chatham, Windsor and other cities.

**THEY RATIFIED IT**

**REPORT FURNISHED BY THE TRADES AND LABOR BODY**

In regard to the Meeting of the Workmen Which Pledged Support to Dr. A. W. Richardson.

Standing room was at a premium in Lebo's hall, on Wednesday night, when, without doubt, the most representative meeting of bonafide workmen, held in recent years in Kingston, by a standing vote, and with-out a dissenting voice, pledged Dr. A. W. Richardson its utmost support to elect him as the independent labor candidate for mayor for 1907. Upon request, promptly, at eight o'clock George B. Coward took the chair and called on Dr. Richardson to address the meeting.

For upwards of an hour Dr. Richardson, in eloquent terms, defined his position to the delight and satisfaction of the electors.

William Kelly, received with rounds of applause, then gave a brief resume of the general question, and explained how Dr. Richardson became the independent candidate for mayor. After a stirring address by James Lee, secretary of the Trades Council, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that with the example of the workmen of the city of Hamilton, and also the example of the British workmen before us, in the opinion of this meeting, the time has come when the workmen of Kingston, as taxpayers, and electors, should take an actual part in the conduct of our civic affairs."

"Resolved, that the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, that this meeting pledges its support to elect Dr. A. W. Richardson as the independent labor candidate for mayor for 1907."

After three cheers for the king, those present began the work of organization by appointing the following committees: General management, finance, advertising and banners, voters' lists, etc., canvassing corps, scrutineers, chairman and committees for the various wards.

**C.P.R. REDUCES FARES.**

Cut Half a Cent a Mile on Lines in Great West.

Winnipeg, Dec. 13.—Officials of the Canadian Pacific railway have decided to reduce local passenger rates in the west over a considerable area from four cents a mile to three and a half cents a mile, or a reduction of half a cent.

The territory which will benefit by the reduction is that lying between Macleod, Calgary and Dumont Junction, a short distance from Medicine Hat and Edmonton. The whole of this country has been much settled of late and the substantial reduction will be welcomed by a large number of settlers and travelers.

**To Buy Power.**

Hamilton, Ont., Dec. 13.—At a special meeting of the city council, held to-day, two readings were given to by-law to be submitted to the electors, authorizing the council to enter into a contract with the Hydro-Electric Power commission for 15,000 horse-power, the price not to exceed \$16.25 per horse power per year.
