A WRIT IS ISSUED TO STOP TRESPASSING ON PROPERTY.

A General Denial Made to Charges Laid Against Governor Vanant—Sinclair Wants to Have Sale of Farms Stopped.

Toronto, Dec. 17.—A writ was issued at Osgoode Hall, today, by the Western and Northern Land company against A. Loney and G. R. Smith, the mining recorder, to have it declared that a certain lot is the second concession of Bank Township, part of the property of the plaintiff, and that the claim is not open to prospectors, for an injunction to prevent Loney from trespassing on the property and for a mandamus to compel Smith to issue a proper certificate he may have given.

Eleven charges were filed against Garrett R. Van Zant, governor of Toronto jail, this morning, and to these the governor makes a general denial. In the document outlining these charges, accusation among employees is alleged and that no attempt was made to maintain discipline, and that they were willful breachers of the regulations. Improper and immoral conduct on the part of the governor towards female prisoners, visitors and employees is also charged. It is said that while one of the guards was suffering from a contagious disease, the governor failed to report the fact to the inspector. The rights is further reserved to more charges as the hearing proceeds.

The high court, today, granted to Donald Sinclair, Toronto, an injunction against Fraser Bros., of Moncton, restraining the latter from selling 143,000 ferns which are now in possession of the G.T.R. till after December 27th. Sinclair claims the Moncton people had contracted to deliver to him 500,000 ferns, but that while he had paid the money, he had not received the ferns, and that Fraser Bros. had sold to other people.

RECAP LAND LAWS.

Washington, D.C., Dec. 17.—President Roosevelt has sent a message to congress on the subject of public land laws. He says that the developments of the past year emphasize, with increasing force, the need of vigorous legislation to recast the public land laws and to adapt them to the actual situation.

The soldiers state that they thought that they were helping the ladies a good service, and naturally felt rather hurt at the treatment they received.

Was Run The Wrong Way.

Car No. 13 had an accident on Saturday afternoon, resulting in breaking her trailer wheel. No. 23 was put on to take her place, and was run around the left line backwards, for some reason which caused considerable trouble, as patrons were forced to walk around the car through the slush to the left hand side. Many comments were heard about the thoughtlessness of the street railway company.

CAN PLAY IN ENGLAND.

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—President Tasse received confirmation, at noon, of the decision of the English Athletic Union to permit the Ottawa lacrosse team to play a series in England, and Mr. Tasse says the first game will be played about the middle of April or first of May.

HAMILTON GETS BILLS FOR CALLING MILITIA.

Hamilton, Ont., Dec. 17.—The city has received another bill from the militia authorities. Saturday's bill was for the maintenance of the troops sent here to quell the strike riots and the one received today, which is for \$4,583.33, is for transportation, and for paid in officers and men for the time they were here. The accounts already received total \$6,375.59. The authorities do not think that the city should be charged with anything more than what it would have cost to keep the soldiers had these remained in their regular quarters at Toronto and London.
