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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS, Any even numbered section of Dominton Lands in Manitoba or the NorthWest Province, excepting 8 and 26, not
reserved, may be homesteaded by any
person the sole head of a family, or male

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x
1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more

Application for homestead entry or in-ection must be made in person by the upon having a survey made, and upon plicant at the office of the local Agent complying with other requirements, pur-An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent's office may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. In case of "personation" the entry will ation within one season from the date be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfest all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been discount of the entry will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favour of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or eister, if Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to the applicant for inspection will be entired to prior right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particulars the homesteader is in default, and if subsequentry the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry should the land become vacant, or if entry has been granted it may be summarily cancelled. Buties.—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the tollowing plans :- (1) At least six months' residence up-

year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for hy such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead. the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.
