A GIRL SAVED

But Not in Time To Prevent Death

FROM EXHAUSTION

BROKE THROUGH THE ICE AT GANANOQUE.

Her Companion Made 'Heroic Efforts to Save Her—Miss Lucy Fenock the Victim—Taken From Water Alive.

Gananoque, Dec. 20.—A very sad drowning fatality occurred between four and five o'clock yesterday afternoon, on what is known as the bay. The ice there has been in splendid condition for the past week and the young people have been enjoying it during the afternoon and evening, and yesterday afternoon Miss L. Fenock, an employee of Mrs. N. E. Baker's millinery establishment, in company with Glenn Berry, went for a skate and skated upon a patch of thin ice where Mitchell & Wilson's boat had been and been lately removed. They succeeded in getting her on the back and breaking considerable ice in getting where it was safe. But the young woman could not hold on and lost her grip and went into the water. Her companion succeeded in getting her out of her but could not get her out. In a short time assistance came and both were removed from the water. Life was not extinct, but although medical aid was promptly on the spot the young woman succumbed. The young man was also in an exhausted condition, but will recover. Deceased was about eighteen years of age and a favorite with all for several years and past. She has been a member of the young ladies' Bible class of Grace Methodist church.

The New Morgan Liner.

New Orleans, Dec. 20.—The Monna Southern Pacific Steamship company, the first of the new steamships built for the New York-Oriental service, was recently launched, and will be placed in commission early next year. The Monna, which is larger than the other two ships in the line, is a seven-ton motor, and will carry a hundred passengers. She is entirely new class of coastwise vessel, which give her the massive appearance of some of the big trans-Atlantic liners. She has splendid cabin accommodations and is equipped with wireless telegraph apparatus. The vessel is expected to reduce the time between New Orleans and New York by three hours.

Insurance Claims Reputed.

Vienna, Dec. 20.—All the San Francisco claims against the Austrian Phoenix Insurance company, which have been repudiated by the company, in all, the claims exceed \$2,000,000. Attorney Grier, representing claimants against the company, is preparing to bring suit to test the legality of the refusal.

Will "Try, Try Again."

New York, Dec. 20.—Commander Robert E. Peary, the Arctic explorer, will make another attempt to find the North Pole. Unlike his previous trials, Commander Peary will head the expedition, but will not be the leader of the expedition. Making his ship's winter quarters at Cape Thomsen, he will send out sledging parties in a search for the pole.

Siamese Twins Die.

Montevideo, V. U. Dec. 20.—Twins with two heads and one trunk, born to Mr. and Mrs. John B. Callow, have been severely buried to guard against infection by cholera. The children lived nine weeks. Mr. Callow states that no amount of money would cause him to consider a great number of offers from medical institutions that desired the bodies.

Leaves Pope \$1,000,000.

Rome, Dec. 20.—The death is announced of Mr. Adam, one of the most wealthy Roman nobles. During his lifetime Mr. Adam made valuable presents to Pope Leo XIII. and Pius X., his gift to the latter being a gold pectoral cross, set with brilliants. By his will he left \$1,000,000 to the pope.

Big Gold Nuggets Found.

Albion, Dec. 20.—Several big gold nuggets were discovered recently near the town of Albion. The nuggets, Tarnagalia, and two were found weighing respectively 967 and 373 ounces, the largest seen in Australia in forty years.

COMPROMISE

This Is What Pope Will Agree To

IN FRENCH CASE

HE SUGGESTS WHAT HE WILL REQUIRE.

Rome, Dec. 20.—It is asserted on good authority that the Vatican will consent to the amended French separation law, if it allows sacred functions to be held unconditionally in the churches and does not exact any declaration from the pope. Only wishes the free exercise of public worship, argued the government, but it is not possible that the Vatican should not reserve its rights. Commenting on the report that Monsignor Lacroix, bishop of Tarentaise has been named, or has been nominated, in accordance with the circular issued by the French minister of public instruction, and had formed an association for separation, a high Vatican authority, says:

ITS DEATH BLOW

LORDS INSISTED ON THEIR AMENDMENTS.

The Motion of Lord Lansdowne Was Carried by a Large Majority—Lively Time Expended in House of Commons.

London, Dec. 20.—The education bill received its death blow in the House of Lords, yesterday. Both sides had spent the previous three days in practically incessant conferences with the object of discovering an acceptable compromise, but the opposition found themselves unable to accept the concessions offered by the government. These were formally presented by the Earl of Lansdowne, on behalf of the opposition, and the bill was carried by a large majority. The bill was adopted by 132 to 52 votes.

Memory Lost But Other Faculties Unimpaired.

London, Dec. 20.—The long retirement of Joseph Chamberlain, owing to constant ailments, has led to constant speculations and contradictions concerning the gravest, the ex-colonial secretary's condition. The Chronicle states Mr. Chamberlain has been overworked by his duties, and his health is impaired. The report is revived that the Harmsworths, the London publishers, are to start a daily paper in this country, and it is said it will be located in Ottawa.

ACCUSED OF FRAUD.

Lord Delamere Has Been Sent For Trial.

London, Dec. 20.—A despatch from Mombasa, on the east coast of Africa, says that Lord Delamere, prominent in English society, and who has wide connections among the aristocracy, has been committed for trial, at Nairobi, on a charge of fraud. A solicitor, who is accused of abetting him, is also committed. Lord Delamere left England, last year, to reside near Nairobi, where he built a fine house and bought 100,000 acres of land, intending to grow cotton and sugar.

Seeking Damages.

Windsor, Ont., Dec. 19.—The Canadian Electric Construction company has registered a lien against the lands of the Windsor, Essex & Lake Shore Railway company for \$1,335. The Canadian Electric company is a subsidiary contractor for the Keystone Construction company, an American firm, who were the original contractors for the railway. The Canadian company was to have completed its construction work last June and claims damages for delays, caused by difficulties it had with the railway company in getting supplies to carry on the work.
